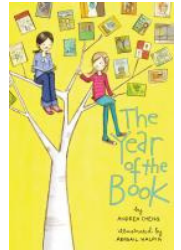

Baxter was selected for the award for "outstanding contributions to the medical literature," shown by his paper "Ultrafine Particle Exposure During Fire Suppression—Is It an Important Contributory Factor for Coronary Heart Disease in Firefighters?," published in the August 2010 issue of ACOEM's Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine.

The award, established in 1948, recognizes the authors of an article of outstanding significance in occupational medicine. Baxter will accept the award on behalf of the entire research team—which included UC's James Lockey, MD—on April 30 at the 97th annual American Occupational Health Conference in Los Angeles.

Uma Kotagal (Paddock) was named one of *The Enquirer's 20 Professional Women to Watch in 2012*. She is Senior Vice President - Quality and Transformation at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center. There she is working on efforts to reduce errors and advance research for Children's health

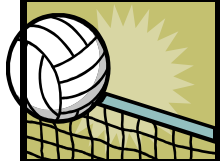

Adopt a class works with the kids in different ways... like career days, nutrition lessons, etc. and when we do not have a "whole class" event planned then we do one-on-one games & little tutoring type things like counting, letters, etc. It's once a month for about an hour. If someone in the neighborhood wants to do a little presentation about their job or something they do that would be great and it will be our activity for the month. If we could get more neighborhood volunteers to come that would provide a little more interesting things for the kids. Our next date is **April 25 from 1 to 2pm**. In May we will have a year end party (date TBA)

In case there was some confusion after last months article, it is not necessary for the Adopt a class volunteers to get a background check or sign paperwork, volunteers are there with NANA.

What can we do about the violence? It is a long term problem and solution but we can start. The 17 - 25 year old perpetrators are likely parents of children in our schools. Educating these children will combat future violence..NANA has begun by adopting a kindergarten class at South Avondale. More North Avondale involvement is needed. These plans are what we have in mind: Plan for an end of year event. Help the teacher by funding items that she would

Ms. Yvette Simpson from Cincinnati City Council came to The New School



Montessori last month to hear our fifth and sixth-grade students' city-planning proposals for the Greater Cincinnati Community. These students have been working throughout the school year on various aspects of city planning as part of their independent studies. Yvette Simpson joined a crowd of parents, grandparents and friends who listened attentively as the student-planning teams presented the projects they chose to research and design.

We heard a presentation from a group of students who studied potential plans for a Cincinnati subway system. Students shared small-scale models and posters comparing Cincinnati's plans with the Metro in Washington D.C. and presented their own recommendations for a future subway system in Cincinnati.

Another proposal included a project called H.O.M.E. (an acronym standing for Hope, Optimism, Miracle and Encouragement), which would provide interim housing and job training for those currently without a home. Ms. Simpson remarked, "I like H.O.M.E. very much; I might use that recommendation. We call our spaces transitional facilities, but I think H.O.M.E. is a little more homey."

The final presentation was called The Secret Garden and was designed as a complement to the H.O.M.E. project. It included an outdoor facility where residents could enjoy a small pond and greenhouse for growing vegetables to open spaces allowing for sports and playground activities.

At the end of the presentation, Ms. Simpson thanked the students for their work and asked if she could share their proposals with the city's planning committees. She felt encouraged that we have such fine young people who are so willing to research, innovate and share their dreams for improving our city. Teacher, Johnnye White, anticipates taking the students to a city-planning meeting where they will be invited to share their work with committee members.

Xavier University Seeks Input on Urban Farm Project

Xavier University's Sustainability Committee has for some time been working on plans for an urban farm that would both enhance the sustainability dimension of the academic curriculum and contribute to the local production of food. The Cincinnati Park Board is willing to allow this **use for a portion of Victory Park subject to NANA approval.** The proposed Urban Farm area is approximately one acre of land just north of Hayden baseball field. A portion of this area is overgrown with honeysuckle, some of which Xavier would remove. In keeping with Park Board requirements, no trees would be cut down and the sloping area of the land would not be graded. The area to be farmed would be fenced at Xavier's expense. Xavier's intention is to contract with an experienced urban farmer to cultivate the land. The job description would require the farmer to plant flowers inside the perimeter of the fence both to attract pollinators and to contribute to the beauty of the farm and the park. One of the business models we are considering is Community Supported Agriculture, and if this goes forward NANA members would have the opportunity to purchase shares and receive locally grown fresh produce throughout the growing season. Xavier seeks your input on these ideas and the project concept as a whole! SPRING CLEANING? What can you do with things you don't want or need any longer?

Do you have any of the following household items?

- *Bedding, especially twin and full sizes – sheets, blankets and comforters
- *Pillows – clean and gently used
- *Towels and Shower curtains
- *Dishes, Glasses, and Flatware
- *Pots, Pans, and Bakeware
- *Small kitchen gadgets such as can openers, spatulas, knives etc.
- *Small kitchen appliances such as toasters, coffee makers, crockpots etc.
- *Lamps
- *cleaning supplies
- *Paper products such as toilet paper and paper towels

Do you have any of the following furniture?

- *Kitchen or dining room table and chairs
- *Sofa, loveseat, wing chairs or rocking chairs
- *bedroom furniture – we will take clean mattresses!
- *Children's toddler beds, cribs, pack n plays, desks, changing tables etc.

By making a tax deductible donation of any of these items, you will be helping families who are transitioning from homelessness to new homes and apartments. I have been fortunate to have worked with the Church of the Redeemer in Hyde Park as part of the Home Comforts mission, where we have served 11 families (most all with children) in the past 6 months, providing them with basics that most of us take for granted. Once a family is identified (often coming as a referral from the Interfaith Hospitality Network – IHN), the Home Comforts team does an assessment of what is needed. Our partner organization, New Life Furniture, provides them with some basic furniture (see above) and then Home Comforts provides them with household items. Basic necessities such as these are often the motivation needed for families to not fall back into homelessness.

- *To donate household items, please take them to Church of the Redeemer at 2944 Erie Avenue 45208– go around the back to the parking area and enter the right side door during normal business hours (513.321.6700).

VISTAs receive a modest stipend (\$10,692), health insurance, and the option of receiving a \$5,550 Education Award which can be applied to past student loans or future tuition.

The new VISTA at Gabriel's Place will start in mid-July, carrying on the work begun by Leslie Stevenson. The VISTA will strengthen the partnerships needed to support community gardening, cooking classes, and the farmer's market. The VISTA will bring together people who love to garden and cook and people who could greatly benefit from learning these skills. The VISTA will work to develop a strong neighborhood customer base for fresh produce so farmers find it worthwhile to bring their produce to the Market Stand. COMMUNITY PRIORITY REQUESTS (CPR) SUBMITTED

One of the first segments in determining the 2013 - 2014 City Budget is to ask each neighborhood council to submit three budget priorities to be executed in the next budget cycle. Those requests are submitted to the appropriate City departments who have the responsibility of putting together their budget and submitting it to the City Manager and ultimately the City Council. Last month NANA asked in the CPR article for suggestions. Thank you for your input. As Glenwood is our southern boundary, we submitted 1A in collaboration with the Avondale Community Council. Here are the 3 requests:

1. A.) Install/repair curbs and street sewer/ drainage system on Glenwood Avenue from Washington Ave., going west to Vine Street, B.) Street Rehabilitation and improvements (other than Glenwood, as it is top priority) – We will provide a list of priority streets, after reviewing the current rotation list in the Street Rehab Program as compared to the actual condition of the streets.
2. A.) Increase “walkability” along the Reading Road Corridor by completing the construction of the approved design Streetscape, which has been delayed several years due to lack of funding (since 2006). B.) Revisit the redesign of the intersection of Paddock and Reading/ Barry to increase “walkability” and safety in the context of the redevelopment of the area. Also, study intersection of Clinton Springs and Reading to find improvements to the long back-up at Clinton Springs when turning left onto Reading.
3. Install surveillance cameras at the intersection of Reading and Clinton Springs and Burton Ave and Reading Road (MLK Park) to prevent crime, enhance the safety and improve the quality of life for the community.

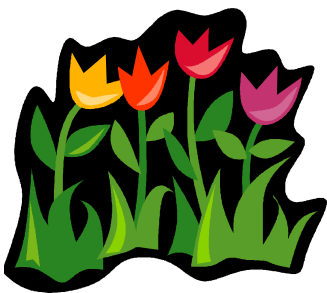
