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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



As President of NANA, I have become more aware of the conditions that exist in the different neighborhoods in the city. I have come to realize that some of the neighborhoods are lucky and some are not.

In the unlucky neighborhoods the houses need painting and the yards are not well kept. No one plants flowers. The residents don't pick up litter in front of their house or on the street. As you drive through the neighborhood you can feel that it is really not a neighborhood at all. That it is simply a place where people live. That they are just passing through. The people there are not committed to the area and there is no sense of community. It's apparent that the people living there do not believe that the look and feel of the area affects their quality of life and is a reflection on them.

The lucky neighborhoods jump right out at you. The houses look great. They are well maintained. The yards are neat. People plant flowers. Neighbors put their trashcans out on time and retrieve them in a timely fashion. Litter is not all over the place. People pick it up in front of their own house and their neighbors' houses. 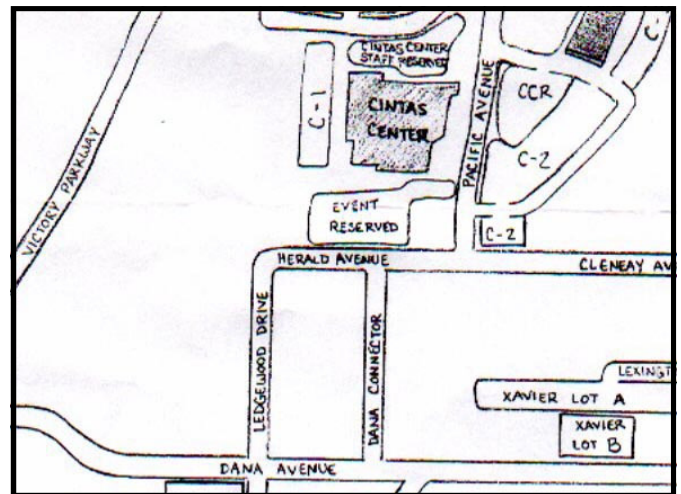

It's been four years since the drugs, prostitution and deterioration began. It's been nearly one year since the operation was shut down. But not until the first swing of the sledge hammer on July 29, did it all finally become history. The memory of the trespassing, break-ins and vandalism, the loitering, the fights, the trash, the 2:00 a.m. police calls, the fear of stepping out at night on your own street began to melt away when a crew of Xavier volunteers joined NANA volunteers in the kick-off of reclaiming 727 S. Fred Shuttlesworth Circle (previously S. Crescent Avenue).

Knocking out make-shift closets, drywall encased stairways and graffiti covered walls which subdivided the hundred year old home, the volunteers felt a deep sense of accomplishment and pride at the end of that long Saturday. With over a dozen volunteers the renovation of 727 S. Shuttlesworth got a tremendous jump start.

Over the next 3 months, the house will be the site of immense activity as contractors tackle everything from roofing and box gutters to plumbing and flooring. In the end, the once derelict house will be completely remodeled, updated and listed at fair market value as a family residence... and an asset to the community.

The property renovation committee includes North Avondale residents Marianne Knue, Jean Wilson, Erik Zimmerman and myself as the coordinator. The garden renovation team is headed by John Jones and Ursula Hassel. To date, the committee has invested nearly 200 hours in the project. And the effort is beginning to pay off. Already, interest in the house is high and neighbors routinely stop by to check progress and share improvements they're making to their own homes.

Kudos to the Xavier St. Ignatius Day volunteers (see both pictures) who worked tirelessly on 727: Mark, Kelly, Andrew, & Jeni Bressler, Janice, Jenny & Lizzy Baughman, Amanda Goubeaux, Allen Kroth, Dave Newman, John Jones, Ursula Hassel, Charlene Morse, Frank Neumann and Spencer Konicov. Kudos to Home Depot and Contractor's Warehouse for their contribution of tools and materials needed for the renovation kick-off. Kudos to King Container for donating the delivery, use and pickup of their 30 cubic yard container to assist with the initial removal of debris.

Kudos to Ethel Cogen and the Department of Neighborhood Services and to Jeanne Gollither and the Cincinnati Development Fund for their financial and visionary support of North Avondale in this vital project. Kudos to immediate neighbors Dorothy Rose and Pat & Eddie Thompson who have graciously agreed to allow contractors to extend ladders, containers and debris into their properties as the extensive renovations get underway.

SAFETY UPDATES

- A rash of cars break-ins have been occurring in North Avondale. Make sure you do not keep valuables in your car. Please report any break-ins to the Police and the NANA machine (221-6166). One arrest was made on Avondale Ave. but unfortunately we had another break-in after the arrest. Help us catch these criminals.
- There is evidence trashcans are being gone through in what appears to be an attempt to find financial statements & credit card solicitations (a clever criminal can use those cash advance checks & credit card applications to their advantage.) Destroy all credit card solicitations and anything you have that may have account numbers or financial information on it before putting in the trash.
- Keep reporting Ice Cream trucks that are violating the loud noise ordinance or are out too late. The Police issued seven citations during the month of August.

REVERSE THE BLIGHT By Pauline Daly

At the July NANA meeting a resident made us aware of an apartment building where the water had been shut off that afternoon. NANA talked to residents of the building and identified additional long standing problems. The Water Department advised the residents on how to get the water turned on as an emergency.

When NANA is made aware of a problem/violation, we will investigate, and write a letter to the landlord. We will forward the violations to the appropriate city agencies and continue to check on their status through our CNAS (Cincinnati Neighborhood Action Strategy) team. To effect a change, residents must notify us of the original problems and advise us if there is no change or inadequate change.

Landlords are responsible for maintaining electrical, plumbing, sanitary and heating systems, and the appliances they supply. They must provide water, hot water and dwelling heat. They must make repairs and keep the premises fit and habitable. They must keep the common areas safe and sanitary. They must comply with the codes and provide garbage cans. For units of four or more the landlord is responsible for trash removal.

Tenants are responsible for their behavior and their visitors. They are responsible for maintaining their premises, the appliances, and whatever is provided, in a safe and sanitary manner. They are responsible for any damage they might cause.

Correcting a situation doesn't happen immediately. Therefore, you need to take action early in the problem. First, talk to your landlord. If you need our help, please call us. Also, feel free to call your city agencies to check whether the codes are in compliance.

Also, now is the time to think about heating systems. The Health Dept has the equipment to check the temperature in your apartment to see if it is in compliance with city law. If you have reason to believe the heat in your apartment will be a problem this winter, let us know.

TAX BILLS By Marvin Kraus

You might want to check your real estate tax data in the Hamilton County Auditor's Office. In the upper left hand quarter of the Base Detail on the Auditor's website (www.hamiltoncountyauditor.org) there is a designation for Neighborhood. I discovered that the Auditor says that I live in Paddock Hills and everyone else who owns a home whose first seven Parcel ID numbers are 1110007 lives in Paddock Hills. I complained to the Auditor's Office. I was informed that the Paddock Hills designation was a mistake which would be corrected during the 2002 Triennial Update. I was further cautioned that the change of neighborhood designation might cause an increase in property value because North Avondale property is valued higher than Paddock Hills property, that is to say the same house in North Avondale would be valued higher than if it were in Paddock Hills. I don't think that's right. If a house is valued at a certain amount, say 100,000, its tax value should be the same throughout the county and should not change because of its neighborhood designation. North Avondale should have the same value factor as Paddock Hills.
