After much sharing, the city suggested that Paddock Hills and North Avondale unite in a planning effort.

So we did. A couple of weeks ago, the old 2002 committee for the redevelopment of the Armory property met. We came up with this motion:

"Paddock Hills Assembly and North Avondale neighborhood Association present to their membership a motion to create of a Not For Profit Neighborhood Owned Development Corporation to develop the Armory Property on Reading Rd. Initially the Corporation shall consist of seven trustees, three trustees appointed by the Paddock Hills Assembly and three trustees appointed by the North Avondale Neighborhood Association and a chairman agreed to by both neighborhood associations. The purpose of the corporation will be to represent the neighborhoods in the development of the Armory Property and any other properties should the opportunity arise.

If you care about what happens to the Armory property, the next NANA meeting is vital. We're going to elect three NANA members to serve on this new Development Corporation!

Please, for all that is good and neighborly – DON'T elect George to this committee!

MULTI LISTING SERVICE (MLS) TURNS DOWN NANA'S REQUEST FOR SEPARATE LISTING

The following is a response to the letter sent from NANA and also published in the October 2004 NANA NEWS

Thank you for your request regarding the creation of an SIC (suburb code) for North Avondale.

Two MLS Committees and the MLS Board of Directors reviewed and discussed your request, approximately 60 brokers, agents and appraisers in all.

After much discussion, the Committees and Directors decided to deny your request. After providing them with the maps you gave me, the statistics compiled from the MLS, and the feelings from people on the Committees who know the area, their main reasons to deny are as follows in no specific order:

- 1) The communities of Avondale and North Avondale are still lacking the overwhelming support for this separation to occur, as shown by the contested area on the maps;
- 2) That this is more of an act to separate an area of growth and development from an area of less growth and development;
- 3) That by creating a new SIC in this situation will only provide a new venue for Realtors to try to market lesser priced property in a higher priced SIC, which fixes nothing.

The MLS leadership is looking at creating less segregation and more unification to make the MLS, the tool for the Realtors, less difficult to use and less difficult to find property for sale. Because of this, yours is not the first request to be denied for this type of SIC breakdown.

The Hamilton County Solid Waste Management District (District) will conduct its 5th annual Computer Recycling Collection Event on June 4 – June 11, 2005. This event is open to **Hamilton County businesses and residents only**. All interested parties must register in order to participate. **Registration deadline is April 29, 2005.**

The following items **will** be accepted at the event: CPUs, hard drives, monitors, printers, fax machines, main frames, laptops, mice, keyboards, speakers, docking stations, PDAs, cell phones, cables, chips, circuit boards, backup batteries, and scanners. The following items will **NOT** be accepted: televisions, telephones, stereo equipment, telephone switches, and copiers.

Businesses and schools registering more than 100 large pieces (i.e. monitors, CPU's) **MUST** drop off their unwanted equipment on pallets and shrink wrapped.

NORTH AVONDALE BUSINESS DISTRICT RECEIVES \$9,000 CITY MONEY

The business district in North Avondale has received Neighborhood Business District Support Funds for 2005. The funding Program is intended to support recognized business districts (NBDs) in 34 Cincinnati neighborhoods. It is administered by Invest In Neighborhoods who also administers the Neighborhood Support Program which yearly funds the 52 neighborhoods \$7,000 each.

The \$9,000 is earmarked for new signage, plants, a brochure, database development and litter control. CINCINNATI PRESERVATION ASSOCIATION HOLDS HISTORIC HOUSE TOUR MAY 7TH IN NORTH AVONDALE

On Saturday, May 7, 2005, from noon to 6:00 p.m., Cincinnati Preservation Association (CPA) will present a tour of eight impressive historic houses in North Avondale. Advance tickets, \$25 for CPA members and \$30 for guests, make a great Mother's Day gift. The homes on tour include **3836 Reading Road**, a Tudor Revival design newly renovated after years of neglect; **700 Betula Avenue**, an Elizabethan fantasy in stone, stucco and tile; **718 Betula Avenue**, a serene Craftsman-style house; **3837 Rose Hill Avenue**, a one-of-a-kind eclectic residence that cost \$20,000 in 1908; **3953 Rose Hill Avenue**, a sophisticated American Foursquare with three porches; **960 Avondale Avenue**, a grand Mediterranean Revival house designed by a major American architect; **952 Lenox Place**, an imposing residence in the Late Romanesque Revival mode, and **1390 Winding Way**, a rare example of the French Eclectic style in Cincinnati.

In the late Victorian era, North Avondale was famed as a "beautiful [suburb]" where "Cincinnati's merchant princes and millionaires" built "elegant cottages, tasteful villas, and substantial mansions." In the early 20th century, leading architects of the day were hired to create splendid homes in Period Revival modes as well as more daring styles. **Today, the neighborhood remains one of Cincinnati's most vibrant and livable communities.**

CPA Trustee John S. Bendel is chairing the event and **Mary Piper** (Avondale Ave.) is a member of the committee. Proceeds from the tour will benefit the CPA.

Founded in 1964, CPA (formerly known as the Miami Purchase Association for Historic Preservation) is a non-profit organization dedicated to advocacy and education for the preservation of the historic built environment in Cincinnati.

As part of CPS' Showcase of schools Burton School will welcome all interested parties on April 16th, 12-3. Burton is the neighborhood school serving North Avondale and it is located at 876 Glenwood Ave, adjoining Hirsch Rec. Center.

After school opportunities include the 21st Century programs at Burton, Girls' Club, Girls' Dance Club, Young Gentlemen's Club, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Girls' and Boys' Basketball and Girls' Volleyball. Additionally students can take part in CRC Afterschool programs at Hirsch.

Burton has a strong emphasis on Language Arts and academics in general. Two Sixth graders had poems published in Kidz Magazine, a national publication. Dibels is being used to assess reading skills and focus interventions. Language!, an intervention curriculum, is being piloted and will be expanded so that the needs of all students are met. Intervention Specialists work with classroom teachers to meet students special needs, including the Gifted and Talented. Graduates go on to many high schools, including Walnut Hills. Last year Burton met the Federal Average Yearly Performance (AYP) in math, reading and attendance and is in the Continuous Improvement category (the middle of five categories).

As a Comer school, Burton recognizes that parents and families are at the center of change. Burton is committed to CPS' Discipline Reform using Positive Behavior Supports and Academic Reform using data and strategies, thereby creating a Positive School Culture. Nonviolence training is being used in conjunction to help with strategies and support the peaceful community. The Civil Rights era has lessons for us today and teachers will incorporate this in their classes. The adults are learning how to help our children meet life's challenges by understanding each other's point of view and being more aware of the consequences of choices.

Burton has a full time Health Center serving the needs of our children. The Mosaic Vineyard Church meets at the school on Wednesdays at 6:30 pm to welcome and support families. Jack & Jill has a Saturday tutoring program. Just completed was the second annual Career Week for all grades, with many occupations being represented. The children were excited and asked many serious questions. Opportunities for future mentoring developed.

This is our community school. Come and see what you are missing.

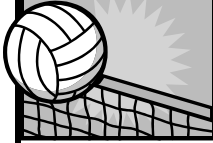
