



OKI Draft FY2021-2024 Transportation Improvement Program

OKI Modifies Their Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Public Hearing Due to COVID-19

Please be advised that the public hearing scheduled for April 6, 2020 has been cancelled. However, we are still seeking public feedback by visiting https://tip.oki.org/draft/. Also found here is the list of draft projects, presentation video and comment opportunity. OKI is encouraging and accepting comments and feedback until close of business on April 8, 2020.

The Region's Metropolitan Transportation Plan is monitored and implemented through the TIP process. Specifically outlined in the TIP are the Region's highway, bikeway/pedestrian and transit improvements that are federally and/or state financed. Before local jurisdictions can move forward with any proposed project implementation or construction, that project must first gain approval for use of federal or state dollars by the Region's policy board and become a part of the TIP.

The Final Draft FY2021 – 2024 TIP list includes road construction projects, bike/pedestrian projects, bus/transit and other transportation-related projects and services planned for FY 2021-FY2024 (four years: July 1, 2020– June 30, 2024).

The Final FY2021–2024 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) is anticipated to be adopted on April 9, 2020.

Public feedback is encouraged and written comments will be accepted through EOB April 8, 2020.

• Ohio's official primary Election Day has passed, but voters who didn't get a chance to go to the polls March 17 because of the COVID-19 outbreak still can cast a ballot. The General Assembly has set **April 28th as the final day of the 2020 Primary Election.** Voting by Mail has been extended through April 28, 2020. **First you must submit an absentee vote-by mail application to receive a ballot in the mail.**

Ballots may be mailed to the Board of Elections or dropped off using our secure 24-hr drive-up dropbox located at the **Board Office**, <u>4700 Smith</u> **Rd. Cincinnati**, **Ohio** 45212




- Ballots that are mailed must be postmarked by April 27th and received by the Board by May 8th and will
 be added to the Official Count.
- Ballots that are dropped off must be at the Board of Elections by 7:30pm on April 28, 2020. Voting In-Person:
 - Voting in-person is limited to voters with a qualifying disability or voters who cannot receive mail.
 - In-Person voting will take place at the Board of Elections office on April 28th from 6:30am-7:30pm.
 - Voters with qualifying disabilities may also choose to vote by mail.

YWCA NAMES EIGHT WOMEN AS 2020 CAREER WOMEN OF ACHIEVEMENT

Eight Cincinnati-area women have been selected as 2020 YWCA Greater Cincinnati Career Women of Achievement, outstanding role models for their leadership, vision, community service and renowned professional success.

North Avondale, Valley Lane resident Jeanne Rehling-Golliher, President and CEO, Cincinnati Development Fund was one of the recipients.

She has been called an "unlikely banker" and the "fairy godmother of economic development." Jeanne Golliher has attracted hundreds of millions of dollars to support transformational projects in Cincinnati's most struggling neighborhoods. Even before the revitalization of Over the Rhine was on the community's radar, Jeanne initiated a partnership with Downtown Cincinnati Inc., the Cincinnati Business Committee, the Federal Home Loan Bank and area banks to launch the Urban Living Loan Fund, which stimulated new housing development downtown, and in OTR. Within three years, 164 housing units and 17 commercial units had been financed in once dormant neighborhoods.



A former banker and real estate lender, Jeanne assumed leadership of CDF in 1998 with unwavering advocacy for affordable housing that would create vibrant, diverse neighborhoods. Since she assumed the helm of CDF the staff has grown from three to 14 employees with assets multiplying from \$200,000 to more than \$59 million. Her team oversees nine loan funds and a service portfolio of loans in excess of \$239 million.

Says nominator Kay Geiger, "Jeanne's career success is the result of her passion for people and places. She cares about dignity and quality of life for everyone in Greater Cincinnati and has devoted her career to revitalizing local communities to benefit all residents."

outstanding contributions to community development, 2018
