PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Hello Neighbors,

We finally see some light at the end of the pandemic tunnel! With the rollout of the vaccine we are getting closer and closer to normal life again. I was able to get my first dose last week and I wanted to share some info for anyone looking for an appointment.

One of the closest places to North Avondale is the drive through **vaccination center at UC Health**. They open up new appointments every Thursday at 8am and they have a hotline if you need help with getting a vaccination appointment. Anyone can **call 513-584-DOSE (3673)** to get a vaccine appointment. You do not need to be a current UC Health patient. The more folks who get vaccinated, the faster things can move forward!

As we get control of this virus we are also faced with the challenges of economic recovery after a year of shutdown. The City of Cincinnati is receiving \$291 Million in Federal funds to assist in jumpstarting our economy. Several members of the City Council are seeking input from citizens on how these funds should be used. Now is our chance to let City Hall know what our priorities are!

COVID Vaccinations

As of the time of this writing, appointments are still required and the governor is expanding the eligible groups for the vaccine on a regular basis based on the supply. Go to coronavirus.ohio.gov to get current information on vaccine locations. Most vaccination locations require

- 1. The patient to wear a mask while in the vaccination facility.
- 2. There is no cost for the vaccine, but the patient will be asked to provide insurance information.
- 3. The patient will also be asked for a form of identification (A driver's license is sufficient).
- 4. The patient will be asked to wait 15 minutes following the vaccination for the health professionals to observe you to ensure that you are not experiencing any adverse reactions.
- 5. If the vaccine requires a second dose, it may be scheduled during the appointment or the process for scheduling will be identified.

The Cicadas are back

Cincinnati is one of the hot spots for the cicadas who plan to appear sometime between May and June according to Gene Kritsky, an entomologist at The College of Mount St Joseph. Many of us have memories from 2004 or 1987 when not only did the cicadas cover car windshields obstructing the driver's view, but the male cicada's mating song drowned out flying jet planes! Cicadas have been hiding underground since 2004. They make their way to



the surface once the soil reaches 64 degrees. Their job is to mate, lay eggs on tree branches and then die. They are really harmless. They don't bite or sting and they are not poisonous. But they are a nuisance! Their underground tunnels aerate the soil; their dead bodies can be nourishment for some trees. And they are a food source for many animals. Moles are having exquisite buffets right now with cicadas as the main entrée!

Be aware of the cicada return. Prepare for them, and don't freak out. Let them do their thing. They will only be a pest for about 6 weeks. Then you can return to your "COVID Normal"!

• Ivy on your trees could be very harmful Love your trees...get rid of the wintercreeper and English ivy.

Many trees in our neighborhood have large wintercreeper or English ivy vines growing up them. Not only can this harm your trees, making them more susceptible to limb breakage during storms, it also greatly promotes the spread of wintercreeper and English ivy, two very invasive non-native species that have invaded large parts of Burnet Woods and many other wooded areas in Cincinnati. Spring is a great time to free your trees from



these plants. This can be done by simply cutting out a 2 inch segment of the vine near the base of the tree. Don't try to pull the vine off, as that will damage the bark of your tree. The vine will fall out naturally after it dies. To learn more: Click Here

• Save the bees Save the planet

This is a honey bee. The pollen on her legs is from dandelions. Her tongue is sticking out due to what killed her that was on the dandelions. It's spring, dandelions are the bees first food. This bee is dead from weed killer spread on what we see as weeds, but what nature sees as food. Please don't spray for weeds until you see the blackberries blooming. In this area, weeds, flowers and fruit trees are bees only source of food until middle of June. There are FAR more weeds than flowers or fruit trees, so it's their only food source. No bees, no food crops for us and we all starve.



Our current vaccines mostly cover current variations, but that won't always be the case if we allow it more time to mutate.

unfortunately - that isn't the case (I certainly wish it were). If we don't reach herd immunity, the virus will continue to mutate, and our vaccine may not cover it any longer. 

• The New School Montessori is proud to own 2 bee hives that provide countless learning opportunities for our students. And now, with Carrie Driehaus' help, our bees have given us lip balm!

Carrie Driehaus, a New School parent and part owner of Queen City Pollinator Project, cares for our hives and presents lessons, demonstrations and provides glass beehives for classroom observations. Carrie is always finding new ways to engage the students in learning more about the lives and work of these bees. And last month, Carrie used several sheets of empty honeycomb from our hives as the wax component for homemade lip balm for the students.

Honeycomb is the basic structural component of a hive and is incredibly lightweight and strong. These 3 dimensional sheets of hexagonal cells are made by bees scraping and molding wax that is secreted from their bellies. Bees can reuse honeycomb from year to year, storing honey in the cells or even the queen's eggs. Newly made honeycomb is white, while older honeycomb is darker in color.

Steps to make lip balm:

- 1. Carrie broke up the waxy honeycomb into pieces and tied it into cheesecloth bags where she heated it on the stove until the wax melted out of the cloth and floated to the top of the water.
- 2. Carrie discarded the bags and poured the liquid into paper cups to cool where the wax soon rose to the top of the cup, firmed up and was gathered for the next step.
- 3. Carrie infused almond oil with aromas from flower petals, orange essential oil and camomile extract as she warmed them together in a crockpot for an hour and then strained out the petals.
- 4. The aromatic almond oil and the hardened beeswax from the paper cups were combined, melted, stirred and then transferred into lip balm tubes with droppers.

Voila! New School Montessori Lip Balm!
