
NANA expresses much appreciation to **Ursula Hassel** as Beautification Chair from 1998 to 2013. During her term she not only dedicated countless hours to making sure our

LAW & SAFETY:

•While there have been a few arrests of juveniles responsible for a few recent burglaries, we continue to have issues with juveniles knocking on front doors and asking strange questions. It appears they may be trying to determine if home owners are present; if no one answers, or indicates they are home, burglaries may be attempted.

The Police suggest that if we see suspicious behavior/activity, do not try to approach the suspects, and keep your safety in mind. Let them know you are home by turning on lights, or other measures. If you see anyone taking pictures with a mobile phone or writing down information, please call police with details. It would helpful if you could document the suspect(s) descriptions such as approximate age, race, sex, height, weight, clothing, any bags, and anything unique or specific and note if the suspect is on foot, bike, or vehicle. Try to get a vehicle description and a license plate number. Report it by calling 911. Please also notify NANA at nanacincinnati@gmail.com.

The City Health Department would like community input in determining why residents have longer life expectancies. One way to do that is by attending a community roundtable, "How long will you live?", on January 10, 2014 at 8:30 a.m. at the Community Action Agency, 1740 Langdon Farm Road. Speakers will engage community members and organizations around several key questions surrounding the issue of life expectancy and disparity. More extensive data on income, education, and health status and access will be available.

- Working with community councils to establish or support existing wellness committees focusing on implications for neighborhoods and the region.
- ➤ Working with city staff on the ongoing implementation of the Cincinnati Comprehensive Plan to maximize the health impact of the built environment, placement of industry, and the walk- and bike-ability of communities, etc.
- Partnering with hospitals, academia and civic organizations on ways to best turn this data and further research into positive health outcomes.

"This information presents an opportunity and is a call to action for Cincinnatians," said Dr. Camille Jones, Assistant Health Commissioner. "Attend the roundtable, form a neighborhood health council*, use this information and have discussions with civic and business interests to find ways to improve health outcomes,"

≈Trash Amnesty Weeks

During Trash Amnesty Weeks, residents may set out additional trash in sealed plastic trash bags next to their approved City-provided container. Amnesty weeks are centered around holidays when households typically generate more trash than normal.

Upcoming amnesty days include:

• Thanksgiving: Nov. 30 to Dec. 6, 2013

• Winter Holidays: Dec. 26, 2013 to Jan. 3, 2014

• Memorial Day: May 27 to May 31, 2014

• Independence Day: July 5 to July 11, 2014

• **Labor Day:** Sept. 2 to Sept. 6, 2014

<u>Snow removal</u>

The City of Cincinnati Municipal Code states:

Sec. 723-57. - Removal of Snow. The owner, occupant or other person having the care of any building premises or unimproved lot of land abutting any street where there is a graded sidewalk or a sidewalk graded and paved, shall, within the first four hours after daylight after the ceasing to fall of any snow, cause the same to be removed from the paved or traveled part of such sidewalk. The provisions of this section shall also apply to the falling of snow or ice from any building onto a sidewalk.

Snow or ice shall not be moved into the gutter when the gutter has been previously cleaned, and in no event shall snow or ice from any area other than the pedestrian walk be moved into the gutter.

(Sec. 723-59. - Ice on Sidewalks. Whenever a sidewalk or any part thereof along any building premises or unimproved lot of land shall be encumbered with ice, the owner, occupant or other person having the care of such premises or lot shall cause such sidewalk to be made safe and convenient by removing the ice there from, or by covering the sidewalk with sand or other suitable substance.

Failure to comply with the provisions of this section for a period of more than two hours during the daytime shall subject such owner, occupant or person in charge to the penalty provided for violation of this section.

Penalty, § 723-99-I.



Grandparents were treated to an Arts Sampler featuring Jeffrey Vonderschmidt, playing the cello, Warner Sanker


playing the Suzuki Violin, and Gabriella Chatman playing a solo on the piano.
