I've recently filled an open Board position within NANA. Serving on the NANA Board was not originally in my plans for the coming year. However, I found some compelling reasons to get involved. My hope is by sharing these reasons it will inspire others to become more active in this great neighborhood in which we live.

First off ... being active in NANA directly impacts our property values. Second off... it only takes an occasional hour here or there to make a difference. Third off... it's a great way to meet members of the Community and the City that you naturally would never meet.

For me it all started with volunteering to re-habilitate Washington Triangle. Through that effort I realized that having a maintained landscape improves the curb appeal of all of our homes, reduces the propensity to litter and means a great deal to those who drive by it daily. This included young men, older residents and the busy mom living in Avondale. They took the time to stop and say "thank you", which made it all worthwhile. I also came to really appreciate many of you who gave a helping hand and for which the work could not have been completed without.

Through my efforts on the garden I became aware of initiatives the City sponsors to help "Keep Cincinnati Beautiful" (KCB). It also came to my attention that the more ACTIVE a community is, the more City cares about you. This opens up more resources for improvement that may not have come our way without neighborhood involvement.

Some examples of what can happen when neighbors volunteer:

- NANA volunteers are working with CPD on a daily basis to reduce crime (thank you Michelle!)
- North Avondale was given World Choir Game floral pots to decorate the Reading Corridor because NANA volunteers cared enough to ask for them.
- City Council is considering sponsoring these pots because several communities brought to their attention that the City currently maintains pots with our tax dollars in eight communities but not others.
- NANA has been working with the City on the fate of various foreclosed properties in our neighborhood to ensure they don't fall into the wrong hands. This is critical to the value of our real estate.
- The City has been working with NANA and NABA on the corner lot on Reading and Avondale to ascertain it is developed with our residents in mind.

This is an important time in the City of Cincinnati neighborhoods. There are numerous new City initiatives, which will benefit the neighborhoods. They include the Greenspace Program, Focus52, Citizen Engagement, Neighborhood Summit and many more. These all require some level of participation from NANA members to be included in the benefits. Julie Stubbs from Hamilton County Parks brought some special friends from the rest to TNSM's kindergarten class. While the

temperate forest to TNSM's kindergarten class. While the visitors - a toad and an owl - acclimated to their new environment, the children began their study by talking about the effects of shrinking habitat, the dangers of litter, and the importance of being good stewards to our animal friends. Using rugs to represent advancing infrastructure of parking lots and malls, the children experienced the pinch as their "habitat" shrunk with each inward scoot of the rugs. Discussion moved to noticing that wolves no longer roam in our wooded areas because of their high needs for space.

The children had just completed a study of the human body and were interested in the similarities and differences between their bodies and the toad's and owl's bodies.

The owl intrigued the children by using the 14 bones in his neck to turn his head nearly in circles while the children used the 7 bones in their neck to turn to their heads within our own less impressive human limits. The toad delighted the children with his long tongue that shot forward to gobble up a live insect on cue.

The children had many questions and stories to share about

animals from our temperate forest. Julie was amazed by the knowledge the students brought to the presentation and their love of the natural world.

MITCHELL BIKE LANE BY DOTE STAFF

Have you seen the new bike lane on East Mitchell Avenue? A bike lane is part of the roadway that's designated for use by people on bicycles. Through the Plan Cincinnati process, residents told the City that they wanted more ways to get around besides by car. Bike lanes are a key part of the strategy to realize that vision!

A bike lane provides more safety for people on bicycles, especially on uphill stretches like East Mitchell Avenue – where bicyclists will be moving much more slowly than cars and trucks headed the same direction. The bike lane on East Mitchell links North Avondale to the bike lanes on Spring Grove Avenue and the bike path on Dana Avenue. Connecting these streets with bicycle facilities makes it easier for residents to use bicycles to get around – whether for work, shopping, or just for fun.

In November of 2011, the Department of Transportation & Engineering (DOTE) sent a letter to residents along East Mitchell Avenue asking for feedback on a proposal to consolidate parking on the north side of the street and add a bike lane on the south side. The North Avondale Neighborhood Association was also made aware of the proposal at that time. Only limited feedback on the project was received from letters sent to the residents.

DOTE contacted the North Avondale Neighborhood Association and asked them to officially take a stance on the project. The proposal was discussed at the February 2012 community council meeting, and the group voted to support the project. DOTE sent a second letter to residents in October 2012 letting them know that the project was moving forward and that parking would no longer be available on the south side of East Mitchell Avenue. Parking is still allowed on the north side of the street. Just like you can't park on sidewalks because people need to be able to walk on them, you can't park on bike lanes because people on bicycles need to be able to travel there.

DOTE is certainly aware that some residents may have concerns about crossing the street to get to and from their parked cars. We always strive to balance the needs of all people who use the streets. We believe that the current setup along this stretch of East Mitchell – with parking on one side, and a bike lane on the other – provides the most equitable use for the most people.

Due to complaints from the affected neighbors City Representatives will address this subject at the NANA February 12 General Meeting. (Editor)

⊗Snow removal

The City of Cincinnati Municipal Code states:

Sec. 723-57. - Removal of Snow. The owner, occupant or other person having the care of any building premises or unimproved lot of land abutting any street where there is a graded sidewalk or a sidewalk graded and paved, shall, within the first four hours after daylight after the ceasing to fall of any snow, cause the same to be removed from the paved or traveled part of such sidewalk. The provisions of this section shall also apply to the falling of snow or ice from any building onto a sidewalk.

Snow or ice shall not be moved into the gutter when the gutter has been previously cleaned, and in no event shall snow or ice from any area other than the pedestrian walk be moved into the gutter.

(Sec. 723-59. - Ice on Sidewalks. Whenever a sidewalk or any part thereof along any building premises or unimproved lot of land shall be encumbered with ice, the owner, occupant or other person having the care of such premises or lot shall cause such sidewalk to be made safe and convenient by removing the ice there from, or by covering the sidewalk with sand or other suitable substance.

Failure to comply with the provisions of this section for a period of more than two hours during the daytime shall subject such owner, occupant or person in charge to the penalty provided for violation of this section.

*Notice of Construction Ardmore Avenue Sewer Replacement The Metropolitan Sewer District of Greater Cincinnati (MSD) will begin construction in February to be completed by fall 2013 to replace an aging combined sewer line near Ardmore, Warwick and East Mitchell avenues. About 1,171 feet of new 30-inch sewer will be constructed, and about 850 feet of existing sewer will be filled and sealed in place.

Construction will occur primarily Monday through Friday during daylight hours with some weekend work. Two lanes on Mitchell may be closed during non-rush hour times, and **Warwick Avenue** is anticipated to be closed at Mitchell for approximately one month. **This will make the street two way and re-routed to the south.**
