STRATEGIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Mayor John Cranley has recommended for funding in the 2017 City Budget several neighborhood projects including two of special interest to North Avondale residents. \$750,000 has been recommended for the redevelopment of property at Reading and Avondale Roads (the Gershuny property). This property has been an eyesore for over 40 years in our otherwise thriving neighborhood.

Also recommended is \$450,000 for the city to purchase Alaska Commons. You will remember that NANA supported the residents of Alaska Avenue and Forest Park Drive in their opposition to the building by National Church Residences (NCR), the current owner, of housing for homeless including those with mental health problems, drug addition and/or in the criminal justice system. The residents of this oasis of middle class single family homes in a neighborhood overly saturated with low income subsidized housing, would like to see the NCR property used for development of market housing, possibly a future Citirama site.

North Avondale residents are urged to encourage City Council members to include these two projects in the 2017 budget. via email/mail or by attending the Budget Hearings Monday, June 6th from 6 pm - 8 pm at the Red's Urban Baseball Academy in Bond Hill, 2026 Seymour Avenue, and on Tuesday, June 7th from 6 pm - 8 pm at the College Hill Recreation Center, 5545 Belmont Avenue.



Peter graduated from Auckland University in New Zealand and earned his M.B., Ch.B. from the University of Otago, New Zealand. In 1959 he married Patricia (nee Barr) and then moved to Sydney, Australia to complete his Pediatric Residency at the Royal Alexandra Hospital. In 1962 he accepted a oneyear position to serve as the Assistant Director of the Outpatient Department of Cincinnati Children's with the intention of going to England the following year.
