



Dear Wasson Way Supporter:

I want to let you know that on Tuesday we learned that Norfolk Southern is interested in selling the Wasson Way right-of-way. There has been no price or terms established but



this is a major step forward with the project. As many of you know we have worked for over a year to establish communications with Norfolk Southern and we were frequently ignored. But thanks to our widespread and strong public support, which Norfolk Southern has apparently been following, and the assistance of local attorney Tom Kilcoyne we have not only made contact with Norfolk Southern but they are interested in working with us.

This good news comes at a good time, as we have strong City Council support for the project. Over the last several months we have met several City Council Members who were undecided and they have decided to support the project. Combined with those Council Members, who already were supporters, we have a very strong majority. Laure Quinlivan continues to be a tremendous help with the project.

Over the next few months we will be negotiating with Norfolk Southern to acquire the right-of-way. We are looking forward to working with the City, Hamilton County, numerous local governments, Xavier University, Rails-To-Trails and many others to make the Wasson Way a reality.

LAURE QUINLIVAN SPEAKS ON 4 YEAR TERMS AT NANA ANNUAL MEETING

In a February meeting of the Government Operations Committee, we passed two versions of 4-year terms ordinances. One version has all 9 council members running in a single election every 4 years; the other has either 5 or 4 members running in staggered elections every 2 years. Before council votes one version onto the November ballot, we are seeking community input.

Both versions retain the 8-year term limit. 4-year terms would begin with the 2013 council elections, and we will not reset the term limits, as previously discussed.

I encourage you to discuss both options for 4-year terms within your respective community councils and then share your preference with me and my colleagues. If there is a consensus among your members, we would certainly welcome a statement from your community council. In order to allow ample time for community debate and feedback, we will wait until our August council meeting for the full council vote on which option will appear on the November ballot.
