

HIDDEN GEMS



We are pleased to restage our former “yard of the month” to” featured garden(s) of the month”. This month Beautification brings you two HIDDEN GEMS! We feature two lovely gardens hand tended by their owners.

The first garden at **4220 Red Bud Place** is the home of **Michelle and John Ernst**. When they moved to the neighborhood in 2008, they did not even know their garden had these amazing terraces and stone walls; it was so overgrown! In 2010, they began the big clean out. They uncovered the hedges, brought in new soil, and created perennial beds amongst their foundation plantings. Michelle gets many of her plants from neighbors and friends and says “her garden is a story of failed plants”! (Not so!) When you visit this garden, you will find dahlias (that she lifts every year), zinnias started from seeds, as well as catmint and a climbing Mandevilla vine, which complement the colors of their home, among many other delights.



Our second HIDDEN GEM is at **3935 Abington** and is the home of **Mandy Pritchard**. While this is the 6th year Mandy has lived here, she just started gardening this past year, partly due to available time during the pandemic. Her home has lots of sun and not much soil, so she created visual appeal using pots.

Mandy works at the Cincinnati Zoo and has embraced their Plants for Pollinators challenge on the left side of her driveway! You can do this too. In addition, to pollinators, Mandy feeds hummingbirds, squirrels and people!! She has an ingenious vegetable garden in her side garden and has even made her own potting bench. (Editors note: I don't think I was this handy during the pandemic!)

Mandy's home is on a cul-de-sac and she has cleared out much honeysuckle in efforts to plant wild flowers for all of her neighbors to enjoy. She enjoys “rescuing” plants at garden centers and her current favorite is her beautiful red rhododendron.

DEVELOPMENT

Rubel Property

The Port informed the NA Joint Development Steering Committee (JSDC) on May 24th that they have extended a six month purchase option on 3864 Reading to [Rosemary's Babies Co.](#) There is criteria that needs to be met before a sale can take place. This was in opposition to the JSDC recommendation that it be awarded to [Grace & Grit](#), a minority owned spa and self care business currently located in Silverton.

The JSDC utilized published North Avondale and City plans, development strategy documents and past neighborhood surveys to assess four applicants. Applications and pro forma financials were reviewed as part of the assessment, using criteria pulled from the above mentioned documents. The Port requested we not meet with applicants during our process.

Pursuant to a letter between the City and NANA dated December 13, 2018 "whereas the City committed to attend a NANA General Body Meeting to present on the proposed buyer and end use of this property before granting written approval for the sale of this property", we are awaiting the City to schedule this presentation. **Any immediate comments or concerns related to this purchase should be directed to City officials and City Council.** As the City gives us more information on this meeting, we will pass it along.

BUMBLEBEE

- Excellent pollinator
- Very friendly unless provoked
- Can sting multiple times
- Will let you pet it most times
- Basically a flying fat panda



CARPENTER BEE

- Lives in your fence/wood,
- Males can't sting, but are the aggressive ones
- Important pollinators
- More of nuisance than threat



HOVERFLY

- Wears striped uniform to scare you
- Can't sting
- Follows you around if it likes you



PAPER WASP

- Look scary, but not much of a threat unless provoked
- Build small nests that look like crumpled paper in corners
- Can sting multiple times
- Pollinators
- No sense of personal space



PAPER WASP

- Also look scary, but won't attack unless threatened
- Build nests that look like crumpled paper
- Resemble yellow jacket
- Pollinators



YELLOW JACKET

- Aggressive
- Wants your food and will fight for it
- Minimal Pollination
- Typically live in the ground
- Can sting multiple times
- Primary focus is insects for food



HORNET

- Big and scary
- Mostly nest above ground in big ball shaped nests
- Not aggressive unless provoked
- Eat bees, other insects
- Can sting multiple times, can be fatal



MUD DAUBER

- More interested in spiders
- Nests look like mud "organ pipes"
- Can sting, but extremely rare
- Abandoned nests can become homes for other insects/wasps



CICADA KILLER WASP

- Looks like Satan's nightmares
- Only eats cicadas
- Don't care about you, but will sting if provoked

●The Cincinnati Riding or Walking Network (CROWN) is a vision for a 100+ mile active transportation network comprised of multi-use trails and on-road bike lanes. Stretching from the far west side to all the way east, it will connect more than 356,000 people in 54 communities to significant destinations like parks, schools, centers for employment, retail, recreation, and entertainment.



The Crown is anchored by a 34-mile, multi-use paved urban trail around the City of Cincinnati. This trail loop will connect existing bike trails, and it will create new and safe pedestrian features in communities. The most prominent trails being linked are the Wasson Way Trail in Hyde Park, the Little Miami Scenic Trail, the Ohio River Trail, and the Mill Creek Greenway.
