

Thanks to Captain Paul Broxterman who was reassigned on Sunday, February 14 from District Four to the Special Services Section. Upon leaving he sent NANA this message, "I just wanted to let you know I thoroughly enjoyed my time serving you in District Four. I love the neighborhood and people here. Thank you again for your support." We welcome Captain Mack back to our District. (see article in *From the Police*).

Plan on attending the **Neighborhood Summit** (see information under *Fun With Your Neighbors*) and sign up for the 10:05 - 10:50 B1 Making Your Place Safe - Exec. Asst. Chief Bailey • Captain Maris Herold

Leadership from the Cincinnati Police Department will give a presentation on the new crime prevention place based strategy. Called PIVOT, or Place Based Investigations of Violent Offender Territories. This will be an interactive opportunity to learn about new cutting edge efforts to make communities safe. The presentation will be followed by a panel discussion from several neighborhood leaders.

Again, after the fire inside the abandoned 704 N. F. Shuttlesworth property owned by the Greater New Light Baptist Church (also former home of Mayor Theodore Berry & Judge Ted Berry), I have been actively working with the City to fix this ongoing problem property. The property has been condemned. The church has 30 days to comply and get a VBML (see From Your Neighbors for more information on VBML). A concerned resident brought this to NANA's attention which reaffirms how important it is for proactive residents to bring matters of concern to our volunteer board. Remember NANA is everyone who lives, works or owns property in North Avondale and Block by Block, Neighbor by Neighbor, that is how change is made. A special thanks to Captain Wessel and his department at Fire House 32 (Forest Ave.) for their speedy response. FROM THE POLICE

➢New District 4 Commander

Captain Martin Mack is a 28 year veteran of the Cincinnati Police Department. A native Cincinnatian, Captain Mack is a 1982 graduate of North College Hill High School. Prior to joining the Police Department, Martin attended Walsh University in North Canton, Ohio where he graduated with a



degree in Accounting. In 2010, Captain Mack graduated from the University of Cincinnati where he received a Master of Arts degree in Criminal Justice. Captain Mack is also a 2009 graduate of the FBI National Academy.

In December 1987, Captain Mack was sworn in as a member of the 70th recruit class of the Cincinnati Police Department. Upon graduation from the Police Academy, he was assigned to District Five. In 1989, Captain Mack transferred to District Four where he served until he was promoted to Police Sergeant in 1996, and transferred to District Two. One of the supervisory positions Captain Mack held in District Two was sergeant in command of the Neighborhood Liaison Unit officers. In this role Martin worked closely with the community as the Cincinnati Police Department adopted community problem oriented policing (CPOP) as a model for addressing neighborhood problems.

Captain Mack returned to District Four in 2005, when he was promoted to the rank of Police Lieutenant. During the past nine years, Captain Mack has held numerous leadership roles in the Department that included Assistant Commander of Inspections Section, Major Offenders Unit Commander, and Internal Investigations Unit Commander. In his spare time he is actively involved in several fraternal organizations and social groups, which include the FBI National Academy Associates, National Organization of Black Law Enforcement Executives (NOBLE) and the Boy Scouts of America.

Pollen and Mold Counting Resumes in Preparation for Allergy Season

The Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency has resumed monitoring and reporting pollen and mold counts in preparation for allergy season. February is the time when some trees common in Southwest Ohio (cedar, elm) naturally pollinate.

Pollen and mold counts are available each weekday by 10:00 a.m. at 513.946.7753 or <u>SouthwestOhioAir.org</u>. High counts are also reported on Twitter <u>Twitter.com/</u> <u>swohioair</u> and Facebook <u>Facebook.com/</u> <u>SouthwestOhioAir</u>.

The severity of allergy symptoms depends on the amount of pollen in the air and the degree of sensitivity of the person. To reduce exposure to pollen and mold, the Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency recommends:

•Minimize outdoor activity between 5 a.m. and 10 a.m. – when pollen levels are highest.

•Contact an allergist or doctor for medical advice.

Track pollen and mold counts. The higher the pollen and mold count is, the greater the likelihood that particles will make their way into the nasal passages and lungs and induce allergic symptoms.

When the weather warms up in the spring, additional precautions allergy sufferers can take include:

- •Avoid areas with freshly cut grass and avoid lawn care activities.
- •After being outdoors, it is best to shower and change clothing, as pollen can adhere to clothing, skin and hair. Be aware that pets can also bring pollen into your home.
- •Keep windows closed and use an air conditioner in the home and car as much as possible to reduce the amount of allergens entering.
- •Don't hang sheets or clothing outside to dry. Pollens can collect on them.
