#### **BEAUTIFICATION**

Dear neighbors and friends,

This past week the North Avondale Neighborhood Association won at the Keep Cincinnati Beautiful event the Golden Paintbrush Award for our Walkway Safety Enhancement and Beautification Project which also came with a \$500.00 check for our fabulous neighborhood. Many thanks to NANA's Beautification Committee, the grant writing, and project management team consisting of Emily Harten, Richard Jackson, Bridget McComas and Maura Wolf, and to the 100s of volunteers from our community, the student bodies of University of Cincinnati and Xavier University. Much appreciation goes to all of you who donated your time and made matching financial donations, especially to Richard Jackson for his \$2,000 gift. We would not have received the KCB grant nor the award without the tremendous generosity and support of our amazing community!

Together with our partners at KCB, the Tool Bank, PNC Bank, The Grainger Foundation, United Dairy Farmers, City of Cincinnati Public Services, and Grass Roots Landscaping, we dramatically improved safety and beautified three public walkways totaling over 500 feet by clearing overgrown honeysuckle, mud, ivy, litter and debris, along Clinton Springs near the new round-about and the Historic "Trolley Connector" walkway (connecting Mitchell to Beachwood). These projects and our extensive Great American Clean-ups and Parks' Green-up Day events dramatically improve North Avondale's image as a safe, walkable and beautiful neighborhood to live, work and play! A tremendous thank you to all of you who make it possible for our neighborhood to win first place for the 3rd year in a row! (see picture on page 8)

We also are proud to say that our Councilmember Chris Smitherman (Lenox Pl) was recognized for his litter

campaign called the Golden Glove Award. In the spring of 2016 Chris took it upon himself to create some buzz around the issue of litter, and did so by introducing the #OneBagofTrash challenge-he used several social media platforms to challenge his followers to pick

up one bag of trash, and challenge their followers to do the same. It took off, even garnering support from the Cincinnati Reds, FC Cincinnati and United Dairy Farmers!

In fact, #OneBagofTrash has gone national with similar efforts in Connecticut, Virginia, and North Carolina! These kinds of campaigns get people thinking about litter, help drive action and change behaviors.

Again, this is why our neighborhood is such a great address. We do boast of a great community pride that is unique to us.

3864 Reading- Rubel Property: Attention: we plan to request proposals for redevelopment of The Rubel (3864 Reading), designed by renowned architect Samuel Hannaford. Contact us if you are interested at nanacincinnati@gmail. We are working with the Landbank and the City on this property, not only because it is historically significant, but also because it is in our Business District and eligible for grant funding for a business location. Remediating this blighted property is a significant step in revitalizing our business district and improving the gateway to our neighborhood. We thank Ed Cunningham, Division Manager Property Maintenance Code Enforcement Division for the City for stabilizing the front porch and securing the property. We are currently

working with Structural Engineers to provide a work plan, including cost estimates. (see picture on page 8)

**2-acre City-owned Vacant Lot redevelopment at Reading and Paddock:** The City is in the process of drafting an RFP (Request for Proposals) for developers. Many thanks to Council Member Smitherman for sponsoring the \$750,000 gap funding for development of the site, and to all of you who advocated to City Council, to support the project.

**Traffic Study and Street Calming:** Ken Brawner and Yvonne Fender are the point people for the Vine Street traffic study work with the City's Department of Transportation & Engineering (DOTE). This was approved at last month's General Body Meeting.

Spring 3-season banners along Reading Road and Clinton Springs will be spruced up and re-installed funded by NABA, through City of Cincinnati Neighborhood Support Funds. Many thanks to Vanessa Sorensen and Amy Harten for design work, and to Jennifer Cronk who will help manage the project.

Neighborhood Business District Improvement Program (NBDIP): Grant Pre-applications were submitted by the due date; final written applications are due 4/21/17. Many thanks to Mary Patton who has volunteered to lead the grant submission process. As this is a rewarding, but time intensive process, please consider volunteering to help with NA's submission(s). We welcome your ideas!

#### ISSUANCE OF A DRAFT RENEWAL PERMIT

On October 16, 2015, Ohio EPA received a Renewal Hazardous Waste Facility Installation and Operation Permit Application from Klor Kleen Inc. (Klor Kleen), U.S. EPA Identification Number OHD 980 821 862 located at 351 Ludlow Ave. Cincinnati, OH 45220 in Hamilton County. Klor Kleen operates a commercial hazardous waste storage facility. Midwest Environmental Services, Inc. is listed as the owner of the facility. The purpose of this permit is to allow Klor Kleen to continue the following hazardous waste management activities: container storage and corrective action activities.

For the permit application to receive final approval, Ohio EPA must determine that the permit application is complete and meets appropriate standards and that the applicant has a history of compliance with relevant environmental laws and demonstrates sufficient reliability, expertise, and competency to operate a hazardous waste facility.

The Draft Permit can be viewed at the Public Library of Cincinnati and Hamilton County, Clifton Branch, 3400 Brookline Ave, Cincinnati, Ohio 45220. Questions to the facility regarding the permit application should be addressed to Ray Boyle, PO Box 14029, Cincinnati, Ohio 45250 or by calling (513) 681-9990. The public comment period begins on February 2, 2017 and ends on March 22, 2017. You may send written comments or request a public meeting concerning the draft permit renewal to Ohio EPA, Division of Environmental Response and Revitalization, Attr.: Jessica Cáceres, DERR, P.O. Box 1049, Columbus, Ohio 43216-1049, not later than March 22, 2017.

## FROM THE CITY & COUNTY

#### Love is in the Air

As temperatures slowly warm, our local trees and plants prepare for their own annual rite of spring: pollination. As part of plants' reproductive cycle, pollen is used for transferring male genetic material from the plant to the female reproductive structure of the plant. This allows fertilization to take place so the plant can continue to grow. Like all living organisms, seed plants have a single goal: to pass their genetic information on to the next generation.

Pollen is dispersed by insects and wind, with the latter increasing the amount of allergens in the air. Consequently, those who suffer from allergies may have more prevalent symptoms on windy days and those that immediately follow.

As a public service, the Southwest Ohio Air Quality Agency collects, counts, and reports pollen levels, from mid-February to mid-November, depending upon the weather. The Agency details which plants and/or trees are producing the highest amount of pollen for that particular 24-hour collection period. Residents may find these daily pollen (and mold) counts on the Agency's website at SouthwestOhioAir.org, as well as its Facebook and Twitter accounts.

Typically, pollen levels do not become problematic until April or May, when trees such as hickories, pine, oak, and walnuts are peaking in pollen production. Those who are symptomatic may find it helpful to track the pollen count along with their symptoms to provide an idea of which plants they may be allergic to. Residents should consult their health-care professional for advice on how to manage their symptoms.
