


Neighborhood Flower Pots

Novel Coronavirus 2019-nCoV, Disease Basics

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) is closely monitoring an outbreak of respiratory illness caused by a novel (new) coronavirus first identified in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China. Chinese authorities identified the new coronavirus, which has resulted in thousands of confirmed cases in China, including cases outside Wuhan City. Additional cases have been identified in a growing number of other international locations, including the United States. This is a rapidly evolving situation and there is an ongoing investigation to determine more about this outbreak. There are NO cases of novel Coronavirus in the City of Cincinnati currently. The only people at risk of illness due to this outbreak are those with fever and symptoms of lower respiratory illness who:

- In the last 14 days before symptom onset, a history of travel from Wuhan City, China OR
- In the last 14 days before symptom onset, close contact with a person who is under investigation for 2019nCoV while that person was ill OR
- In the last 14 days, close contact with an ill laboratory-confirmed 2019-nCoV patient.

What are the symptoms for Coronavirus?

Patients with confirmed 2019-nCoV infection have reportedly had mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of fever, cough and shortness of breath. Other early symptoms include chills, body aches, sore throat, headache, diarrhea, nausea/vomiting and runny nose.

How is Coronavirus spread?

This virus probably originally emerged from an animal source but now seems to be spreading from person-toperson. It's important to note that person-to-person spread can happen on a continuum. Some viruses are highly contagious (like measles), while other viruses are less so. At this time, it's unclear how easily or sustainably this virus is spreading between people. Learn what is known about the spread of newly emerged coronaviruses.

How can Coronavirus be prevented?

There is currently no vaccine to prevent 2019-nCoV infection. The best way to prevent infection is to avoid being exposed to this virus and practice these preventive actions:

- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. If soap and water are not available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

Subject: TRAFFIC/PEDESTRIAN CONCERNS AT THREE INTERSECTIONS IN NORTH AVONDALE

Reference Document #201901513

The Council at its session on October 2, 2019 referred the following item for review and report.

MOTION, submitted by Vice Mayor Smitherman, WE MOVE the City Administration produce a report on the below intersections in North Avondale. 1. Clinton Springs Avenue & Reading Road: Residents report the left handed turn signal from Clinton Springs onto Reading Road is very short and the green light for drivers going west on Clinton Springs is even shorter. Drivers regularly run both lights and it's a safety hazard. 2. Red Bud Avenue & Mitchell Avenue: This intersection regularly has accidents. Drivers take the turn too fast, encounter the red light and either hit another car or the driver loses control. An additional concern is this intersection used as a bus stop and children wait at the curb for the bus. 3. Winding Way & Rose Hill: There are reports of drivers speeding along both roads.

Item 1

The intersection of Clinton Springs & Reading will be retimed as part of retiming the Reading Road corridor that is scheduled to be performed in the next 1-2 years. Currently, the intersection becomes congested if the exclusive pedestrian phase for crossing the north leg of Reading is called on a regular basis. The exclusive pedestrian phase provides a safe crossing for pedestrians crossing Reading Road.

Item 2

The intersection of Red Bud Avenue and Mitchell Avenue has advance flashing warning lights that flash prior to the traffic signal. Trees that were blocking the advance flashing warning lights were trimmed by Urban Forestry.

The Department of Transportation and Engineering (DOTE) has been awarded \$500,000 from the Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) Safety Program for the Citywide High Crash Curve Project. The project locations include East Mitchell @ Red Bud; West Fork Rd from Montana to Todd Ave; Central Pkwy @ Brighton PI; and Faraday Road from President to Cass. DOTE will coordinate with ODOT on the schedule and with DOTE's Street Rehab program. We anticipate the Citywide High Crash Curve Project to be completed this calendar year.

Item 3

The reports for speeding on Winding Way and Rose Hill have been referred to the CPD for enforcement.



ABOUT YOUR NEIGHBORS

• Mary Huckaby, a long-time North Avondale resident will be 100-years-old on April 11th.

Mary Huckaby was born Helen Hillman on April 11, 1920. Her mother, Fannie Mae Jones, was gifted a home by her husband Charles Bedford Hillman's mother in 1922. The area was incorporated in 1928 as North Avondale. Fannie Mae raised Helen Hillman on a hill in the woods. "Mary Louise" as she was called didn't know her name was Helen. She got a birth certificate needed for a job at Wright's Aeronautical making airplane parts during World War II. It was discovered that she was legally named after her maternal grandmother "Helen" though called after her paternal grandmother "Mary Louise."

Growing up in St. Andrew's Episcopal Church downtown, Mary saved her World War II factory money towards a house across the private drive from her childhood home.

Mary married returning soldier Lawrence Cleves Huckaby on August 19, 1943 and began constructing a homestead on that hill. The one bedroom frame house where he and Mary eventually raised daughters Carole and Barbara had no hot or cold water, a coal stove and an outhouse. Over the years he added indoor plumbing, a heat pump, an extra bedroom, a kitchen, a garage, central air and a swimming pool. They built an entire house around the original one bedroom frame. The couple acquired adjacent lots where Larry built sheds, kept bees and managed extensive gardens. Mary was always there with a cold beer, a requested tool or a piece of advice. As a reward for their efforts the private drive is now named Huckaby Lane.

The Huckabys were active in the community and in their congregation always prepared to offer labor and bushels of fresh produce. Mary was a Golden Girl at Bethel Baptist Church and active with the Bond Hill Senior Group. Larry was a Deacon at Bethel.




Mary lost husband Larry, daughter Barbara Rochester and brothers, David, Charles, John and Harry Hillman as well as a sister, Clara Sheffield. Surrounded by a host of nieces and nephews who refer to her as "Aunt Min," in reference to Cab Calloway's 1931 hit Minnie the Moocher, Mary Huckaby will turn 100-years-old in Astoria Place of Cincinnati just around the corner from where she was raised. Her legacy on the hill continues with a fifth generation being raised in the secluded wooded enclave maintained by her daughter Carole Douglas, son-in-law John Rochester and grandsons Shadd, Todd and Jason Douglas.

Mary's friends would comment how quiet it was as they sat on her porch enjoying the breeze and the birds. To this day she pines to sit on that porch and "look into St. Bernard." Other days she threatens to throw members of the Astoria staff down the iconic well standing on her hill in the woods.

The expanding Sleepy Bee family is dancing into Avondale this Fall! Waggle is a new concept designed for busy and buzzy lifestyles: quicker-service, same focus on quality, health and community that Sleepy Bee is known for. Their mission is to serve locally- and ethically-sourced, deliciously-prepared food in a welcoming atmosphere, in a dynamic new way.

Waggle specialities are inspired by its Sleepy sibling, perfect for breakfast, lunch or relaxing times of your choosing: pancakes (house-made buttermilk and gluten-free Bee) and lunch bowls made to order with fresh, seasonal ingredients; pasture-raised egg scrambles; and locally-roasted, barista-crafted coffee drinks and teas with organic milks.

The term "waggle" refers to an almost magical dance performed by honey bees as they forage for food in the wild. This amazing performance - which involves flight patterns resembling figure-eights - is a form of collective intelligence, where bees share information about the location of flowers where nutritious nectar and pollen can be found, water sources, and their hive. While it seems exotic, to us this feels similar to how we humans communicate with friends and family about favorite places to eat, drink, work and rest. We hope that Waggle becomes one of yours!

Founded in 2013 by a local pediatrician, an artist, and a chef, Sleepy Bee has 3 locations in greater Cincinnati: Oakley, Blue Ash, and Downtown on 4th street, downstairs from its sister bar, Aster.

In its 2019 "Best of Cincinnati" awards, Sleepy Bee was voted Best Breakfast, Best Gluten-Free Selections, and Best Neighborhood Restaurant by Cincinnati City Beat. It has also been named as one of the Best Breakfast Restaurants in America by Time Out magazine. Its mission includes support for local communities, small suppliers and native ecosystems hosting pollinators that make much of the food we eat possible.

Set-out Time

Garbage carts, yard waste containers, scheduled bulk items and recycling carts should be placed at the curb **no later than 6 a.m. on collection day but no earlier than 5 p.m. the previous day.** Please avoid placing the carts around any obstructions, mailboxes, low-hanging wires etc., and avoid parking in front of cart on collection day. Residents with cart exemptions are required to set out their garbage the day of collection by 6 a.m. Residents are responsible for potential mess caused by wildlife and vandalism when garbage is set out improperly, or when setting out garbage under the cart exemption clause.






Math comes to life at The New School where students design their dream homes and determine the area and perimeter of each room.
