FROM YOUR NEIGHBORS

break in at our house on Rose Hill Avenue while my wife and I were not home. Fortunately, three of our neighbors spotted the attempt and intervened. When they saw one of the perpetrators on our back porch, they shouted at him and immediately called 911. Four boys ran towards Paddock Road, where they were quickly apprehended by the Cincinnati Police. All three neighbors got a good look at the boys, and were able to provide positive identification.

The four boys, aged 15-17, were charged in Juvenile Court with felony attempted burglary and trespass. It took three different court dates to finally come to a judicial resolution. On each of these days my neighbors and I arrived early at Juvenile Court and spent hours waiting for the prosecutors, defense attorneys, and magistrates to perform their duties. One benefit of all that waiting was that my neighbors and I got to know each other much better!

I came away from this experience with several insights. First, there is no substitute for good neighbors who intervene when needed, and who have the commitment to follow through as the wheels of justice slowly turn. These cases could easily have been dismissed had our neighbors been unwilling to get involved. Their actions not only prevented a more serious crime, they also made the entire

The WeTHRIVE! effort, part of the Health and Wellness Committee, at NANA is going strong. WeTHRIVE! supports health and wellness. With grant funding, we are moving ahead with several projects to support our neighbors. We are funding new activities at the NA Recreation Center such as help for veggie gardening, a yoga teacher for adults, and support for the walking club. We are

also recommending funding for a yoga teacher for the summer day camp for kids and considering a cost sharing arrangement with the City to help bring new equipment and programs to the Center. Gabriel's Place and S. Avondale School are also a focus of attention. We are providing weekly vouchers to eligible parents at South Avondale School to be exchanged for produce at Gabriel's Place market. We are planning to continue this process in 2014 as we discuss additional development studies and design sessions as well as seeking increased support from the city. neighborhood safer and stronger.

A second important lesson is that facial recognition of a suspect is vital to successful prosecution. Defense attorneys will seek any opportunity to create reasonable doubt as they protect their client's right to a fair trial. We learned from the prosecuting attorney that identification of a subject based upon his clothing alone may not be sufficient. Fortunately, in this case identification of the suspects was strong and immediate. I hope I won't be a witness to a crime in the future, but if I am, I hope I remember to focus on the suspect's face.

One last thought: We are very fortunate to live in a community where neighbors look after each other, and go the extra mile to help. However, we can't all be on guard all the time, and we never know when something is going to happen. Consequently, in the coming months I plan to install a video surveillance system at the house, just in case my neighbors aren't around to save the day again.
