NORTH AVONDALE "LANDMARK" TREES

We are very loosely following guidelines set up by the East Row Garden Club in Newport when they established their Landmark Tree Program. Suggestions on criteria to consider when nominating a tree follow. Please send your nomination, and its location, and why you think the tree qualifies to Jolene Struebbe at imstruebbe@gmail.com. A photo would be great as well! It is our hope that we can label/recognize these special trees publicly in the future! Note: This program is not intended to have legal overlays.

The "Landmark Tree" program aims to recognize significant trees within North Avondale's urban forest. These trees are valuable assets to the community, and have continued to provide multiple environmental, physical, social, and economic benefits instrumental in shaping our neighborhood. The hope is that this program will encourage deeper appreciation of our trees, especially those of unusual size, historic or cultural significance or other unique characteristics. A tree may qualify as a Landmark Tree if it meets one or more of the following criteria:

- Has attained significant size in height, trunk diameter or canopy spread;
- Has significance because of its age;
- Has special aesthetic qualities for its species;
- Possesses rare horticulture value;
- Has historical significance to a person, place or event.

Final decision on inclusion in the North Avondale Landmark Tree program rests with the Beautification committee.

HEALTH & WELLNESS

When we think of health, we may think of our own personal health and images of sitting in the doctor's office may emerge. When we think of public health, we may gather images of health clinics and hospitals and the rush made by the federal government to provide vaccinations against the coronavirus. However, for decades, indeed, centuries, racism has been a factor in the quality of our health. But if racism did not show it's face at your door, it never became worthy of a second glance. Yet, last year with the memorable killing of George Floyd, racism plopped

itself front and center at everyone's door step daring whoever opened the door NOT to acknowledge it. Racism has been a thorn in the backs of people of color since their arrival on these shores. It has unfairly showered advantages on some people and it has unfairly suffocated others with disadvantages. The topic is way too large to discuss here in this article, but it will no longer be ignored. Racism affects the health of people by preventing people from accessing quality health care. The Centers for Disease Control have declared racism a public health threat. Even the City of Cincinnati through the Cincinnati City Council made a resolution on July 30, 2020 expressing its belief that racism is a public health crisis in the city of Cincinnati. The Council further expressed its commitment to improve the quality of life and health of the city's minority residents. LAW & SAFETY

•Clinton Springs & E. Mitchell Intersection Update:

This intersection is now an all stop. This was implemented since drivers were not yielding to



since drivers were not pedestrians. The city will be installing a message board indicating a road pattern change and they will also be painting the street near the stop sign @ Clinton



Springs...STOP.

•E. Mitchell (near Red Bud Ave) Update:

The city has installed a yellow flashing arrow sign near the curve going west on E. Mitchell, to try to slow down drivers. At this same location, DOTE will be installing a **High Friction Surface Treatment**. This is a safety-first pavement treatment intended to restore and maintain pavement friction to reduce crashes. It is a thin layer of high

-quality polish-resistant aggregate bonded to the pavement surface with polymer resin binder.

Plans are to begin the installation on 6/7 and to be finished 6/11. Of course, this is weather permitting.



•The Planter on Red Bud Ave Update:

The repair work on the planter will be completed at the end of May and re-installed in June.

•Landlords

The city of Cincinnati is cracking down on landlords who are delinquent in taking care of their apartment buildings.

THE LANDLORD'S DUTIES

The landlord must:

Comply with requirement of any building, housing, health or safety codes which materially affect health and safety;

- •Make all repairs and do whatever is reasonably necessary to put and keep the premises in a fit and habitable condition;
- Keep the common area of the building safe and sanitary;
- Provide trash and waste receptacles, if there are four or more apartments in the building;
- Supply running hot water, a reasonable amount of hot water, and reasonable heat at all times;
- Give tenant reasonable notice of intent to enter into a tenant's apartment and enter only at reasonable times;
- PROVIDE THE TENANT WITH THE NAME AND ADDRESS OF LANDLORD AND AGENT, IF ANY, IN WRITING AT THE BEGINNING OF TENANCY;
- Keep all electrical, plumbing, heating, ventilating, and air conditioning fixtures and appliances and elevators in good safe working condition, when these things are supplied or required to be supplied by the landlord;
- Not harass the tenant by unreasonable or repeated demands to enter the tenant's apartment. If the landlord or agent enters without the tenant's permission or repeatedly demands entry, the tenant can recover actual damages resulting from the landlord's entering.

AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD

There have been fox sightings in our neighborhood

"Please do not hurt me or my mom. We just temporarily moved to the neighborhood so we could be safe."

If you have suddenly seen a fox in the yard near your home, there is a good



reason for this. It is denning season. Between the end of March and early April, a mother fox will give birth to between 4 and 5 kits (a baby fox is called a kit). A coyote will often find a fox den, dig out the babies, and kill them. A mother fox knows this and will frequently choose a den site close to people, away from where covotes generally go. A fox will often den under a porch, shed, garage, barn, or side of a hill, trying to keep her little family safe. Please offer them a short-term rental because this is not a permanent situation. If you are lucky enough to see how beautiful an adult fox is, or witness the kits playing (at a distance of course), you will be glad you did! It is not uncommon for Red Foxes to change dens several times during the season, so you may not see them for long. Kits are slow to develop and will not leave the den until they are about a month old. Foxes do not live in a den yearround, only when a mother has babies. During the summer as the kits grow older, you will see less and less of them, and by September everyone will have packed up and moved on. Please do not call a service to "relocate them", they will often be killed. If you see a fox during the day, it does not mean she is rabid. A mother fox works tirelessly to feed her kits and will often be out during daylight hours foraging for food. Foxes are omnivores, generally feeding on berries, grasses, and small rodents. They are solitary and prefer to be left alone. They do not want to hunt and eat your children, mate with your dog, or kill your cat. A fox just wants a place to raise her family safely, please allow her to do that.

Mill Creek

Mill Creek is a public stream and can be used by anyone at any time. That said, as you know, Mill Creek has an industrial past and there are parts of the creek that have physical obstacles which could be dangerous for someone who is not familiar with the area. Also, while the water quality in Mill Creek has improved dramatically and fish and other wildlife have rebounded equally strongly, we still don't recommend swimming in Mill Creek.

The water quality is quite good.....on a daily basis it's better than the Little Miami....but it still doesn't meet the State's standards for swimming. Canoeing, kayaking, wading, and fishing have a different standard and we

frequently guide members of the public for these activities.

For anyone's first time on the creek, I would strongly recommend going out with us on one of our "Urban (Continue on page 8)







