≫MURAL PLAQUE NOW INSTALLED

The next time you drive by the North Avondale Mural on the north wall of the Lenox Garage (3915 Reading Road) you will see on this same wall-facing, close to and readable from the sidewalk, a plaque commemorating the Mural and recognizing significant donors who made this Mural possible. Included among these donors are 38 North Avondale families or businesses. The Mural was designed and produced by ArtWorks in partnership with North Avondale Neighborhood Association (NANA) and North Avondale Business Association (NABA).

The plaque depicts the N.A. Mural as an Ode to North Avondale:

"Rich with history and diversity, North Avondale has been described as beautiful gem in the middle of the city...a place where you know your neighbors and care about each This 880 other. square foot mural honors this historic neighborhood's



character and

community. The design represents strength and aspiration (the pillars), freedom and gentleness (the morning doves), beauty (the flowers) and music and arts (the lyre)."



The actual painting of the mural was done by 6 youth apprentices employed ArtWorks: Sofia Castagna, Carson Neff, Dontriel Nuckols, Amico Phoenix, Toler and Courtney Kvra Watkins. In a feature article (October 9, 2014) the Cincinnati Enquirer and ArtWorks chose their 15 top favorite murals from the 90 murals ArtWorks has created in Greater Cincinnati since

2007. Among their 15 "top favorites" is the North Avondale Mural!

YOUR OPINION COUNTS

The public review period for the first draft of the **Land**Development Code ended on August 1, 2014, so that we could revise the draft Code and Maps based on the feedback given us.

A second public participation process began on October 17, 2014 and will last through January 30, 2015. At that time, Planning & Buildings staff



will take all of the feedback received on the second draft and incorporate revisions into a third draft (which will have a public review period again).

COMMONS AT ALASKA -- UP IN THE AIR

The Commons at Alaska, 3584 Alaska Avenue, is a proposed 90-unit apartment to house a targeted population of homeless persons. As of this writing the development of this Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) project has not gone forward because all the necessary funding has not been finalized.

National Church Residences (NCR), the Columbus developer of this project, is still record owner of 3584 Alaska. NCR has received a commitment for \$10,364,000 in tax credits from Ohio Housing Finance Agency (OHFA); but it still has not received its requested Section 8 vouchers from Cincinnati Metropolitan Housing Authority (CMHA), a necessary component of the financing of this project. Also a portion (\$543,000) of the City's HUD grant to finance affordable housing, previous committed to NCR for PSH, was withdrawn.

In response to a query by NANA about the status of OHFA's grant, OHFA replied, "At this time, National Church Residences has not returned the Housing Tax Credit award for Commons At Alaska. The next step is for OHFA to receive a formal request from the developer, to either move forward with the current allocation or to return the credits. If the developer returns the credits, they may still apply for a special allocation of credits." NCR would have 3 years from the return of the credits to request a special allocation.

The residents living in the vicinity of the Alaska Avenue site, The Avondale 29 Group, continue to oppose this PSH project for the following reasons:

- Avondale is already overly impacted with a large number of publicly assisted housing units, including housing located in North Avondale's shared "territory" between Glenwood and Clinton Springs Avenues.
- Alaska Avenue and Forest Park Drive are an island of home ownership in a community where most people rent their homes. The proposed project will threaten the stability of the area.
- The proposed 90-unit building is out of scale with the majority of the single and two family structures in the immediate area.
- Safety is also an issue. The targeted population include residents with severe mental health issues, alcohol and substance abuse (85%); many with dual diagnoses (30%); some with a criminal history. Treatment is offered on a voluntary basis at other locations. There is not required supervision of the residents. Placing these people at a location already impacted by crime will not be to their benefit and could be detrimental to the current residents of Avondale.
- There was no effort by NCR to contact the residents in the immediate vicinity when the Alaska site was chosen.

The zoning of the site does not permit the targeted

population listed above.

NANA joined The Avondale 29 Group in opposing Commons At Alaska for all the reasons stated above and because the Alaska site, being at the southern boundary of North Avondale, would also adversely our neighborhood. North Avondale residents worked closely with Linda Thomas and Johnie Davis of the Avondale 29 Group in opposing this development.


