Dear neighbors,

October is already here, which is clearly felt with the turn to fall weather this week. This is a great time of year in North Avondale, despite having to haul away the mountains of leaves later...

For general interest ... the neighborhood boundaries of North Avondale, as one of the 52 neighborhoods in Cincinnati, have been in existence for a very long time. They were confirmed in the 1948 Cincinnati Master Plan, the 1974 North Avondale Master Plan, as well as in NANAs by-laws of 1960. NANA sent a letter to the City and our community partners regarding the boundaries and appropriate communication related to development activity and other major city initiatives. There are significant, and some very exciting, developments on the way and on-going in our city, and NANA wants to make sure the appropriate communication channels are in place to stay informed and engaged when it involves our neighborhood.

The NANA October general meeting on Tuesday October 13<sup>th</sup> will have a revised agenda following the Chief of Police transition in Cincinnati. Instead of Blackwell being our guest in October, we will have the new interim Chief of Police Eliot Isaac on the agenda in December. The Police Department is a critical community partner for our neighborhood, so we are looking forward to the discussion with Mr. Isaac, who is very familiar with our neighborhood as District Four Commander from 2007 to 2012.

I would also like to plug a reminder that Mayor Cranley will be our guest speaker at the NANA meeting on November 10<sup>th</sup>. Please come to our meetings to get informed and be a voice of the neighborhood. It is of mutual benefit to provide strong community input to the city's top officials.

## HEALTH

### Health Department News:

- The Cincinnati Health Department is sponsoring a year-long series of Infant Mortality Brown Bag sessions from 11:30 - 1 at the Health Department, 3101 Burnet Ave. The first session was held September 18 on Maternal and Prenatal Education. The next on will be Friday, November 20, 2015 on Resources for Pregnant Women and Mothers. The sessions are free and so is parking.
- TriState residents are blessed to live near a water source like the Ohio River. However, caution must be taken when we consider the toxins and other impurities that water can host and thereby harm us. The Ohio River is currently being monitored for blue-green algae blooms. They appear as colorful scum on the surface of the water. They can produce toxic chemicals which can produce a rash, hives, diarrhea, vomiting and abdominal pain. The Health Department advises citizens to be observant while enjoying activities on the river. These advisories apply also to pets. Seek medical attention if you or your pet become sick after having had contact with the river.

## LAW & SAFETY

On September 16, 2015, the Law and Public Safety Subcommittee met with Captain Maris Herold, Officer Lori Hamann and Cincinnati Assistant City Solicitor, Mark Manning to discuss 3652 Reading Road, the Entowne property which falls under the *legal* threshold of the top 5 city-wide worst chronic nuisance properties. Mr. Manning advised that the city is in litigation with the owners of 3652 Reading. The litigation involves the Reading Road location and few other properties. It is about time this has happened as Michelle Baxter and vigilant residents have been working on chronic problems with this property since before January 2007 when the Chronic Nuisance Ordinance went into effect.

Baxter and Charlene Morse attended meetings at the City, County, State & Federal levels. The goal was for higher housing quality standards and to make HUD hold their landlords liable for criminal behavior that occurs in and around their properties. Subsequently the Law and Public Safety Subcommittee participated in a meeting with staff members in Congressman Chabot's Office to again discuss engaging HUD to assist with addressing these problem property issues. Michelle has continued to advocate to protect, preserve and enforce the laws on the books to prevent the crime plaguing the residents and victims that live in and around these buildings. Safety is our number one priority living within the urban core and it is about time the resources available to us through the laws and ordinances are enforced.

- The next committee meeting is Wednesday, October 14th at 6:30 pm at the Recreation Center. The meeting will not be long. Let me know if you can attend.



### **PARK LEVY AS CURRENTLY WRITTEN WILL FURTHER DIVIDE THE HAVES FROM THE HAVE NOTS**

I join former City Council Member and Civic Leader Marian Spencer in opposing the proposed Cincinnati Parks levy (*Cincinnati Enquirer*, September 8, 2015).\*\* As a long time public parks supporter my husband and I worked closely with Donald Spencer several years ago to "Free Krohn", a successful movement to insure that the Krohn Conservatory as well as other Cincinnati Parks activities would remain FREE OF CHARGE to all Cincinnati residents. Shortly after Donald Spencer died, a charge to visit Krohn began.

**I oppose** this proposed Parks Levy because it will be a

Charter amendment rather than a normal property tax levy. As a Charter amendment this levy will continue indefinitely. The levy language states that money from this levy can only be used for capital improvements and not for operating and maintaining those improvements that are made. Where will the money to maintain new trails and parks and pavilions come from? Will there be a charge to bike the Wasson Trail as we have to pay to ride the Carousel at Smale Park? Will there be a charge to visit a King Record Pavilion proposed for Evanston as we now have to pay to visit Krohn or to view Lumenocity and other events at Washington Square Park?

**I oppose** the proposed Parks Levy because the money raised will not be used to maintain our public parks as a source of pleasure for all Cincinnatians to FREELY enjoy, but could be used to develop special interest activities for which people will have to pay to use. While the *Enquirer* has listed 13 proposed park projects totaling \$88.5 million, the wording on the ballot does not require that levy money be spent on any of these listed items.

**I oppose** this proposed Parks levy because, according to the language on the ballot, "25% of annual levy revenue shall be made available to the board of park commissioners for any use authorized in subsection (a) **except for payment of debt service.**" Up to 75% of the money raised annually can be used to pay interest to Bond holders who will buy the bonds this levy will underwrite. Why can't we have a normal property tax levy where all the money collected (estimated to be about \$5 million annually) not only can pay for new park projects but also for new and current operating park expenses? Why can't we have a tax levy that can be renewed every 5 to 10 years to insure financial responsibility?

I speak out of my love for the City parks as reflected in my park activities over the years. When during the 1980's the Park Board could not afford to maintain the flower beds along Victory Parkway, we led a group of North Avondale Neighborhood Association (NANA) volunteers to plant and nurture flowers on Victory Parkway between Rockdale and Dana Avenues. We also led the movement to transform a slum apartment building on the corner of Reading Road and Clinton Springs Avenue into the lovely Seasongood Square Park where 85 trees were planted. Today all can freely enjoy the passive pleasures this park provides.

As a long time park lover and park supporter and park worker, I believe the City of Cincinnati can do better. It can come up with language for a Parks Levy that will maximize the true purposes of public parks as a source of pleasure, relaxation and renewal for all to FREELY enjoy, not just those who can afford to pay for its amenities.




## FROM THE CITY

### ☛ Road Construction In North Avondale

- There is going to be a roundabout at Dana & Clinton Springs
- Construction should continue on the roundabout for another 3 weeks. Landscaping in the island should immediately follow.
- The construction of the roundabout will be completed in two phases that will require separate traffic restrictions. A map of the first phase is attached. This phase closes Clinton Springs Avenue between Dana Avenue and Reading Road. This traffic pattern is already in place and should remain for approximately another week, depending on weather.
- The second phase should take approximately 2 weeks. The traffic restrictions are as follows: Clinton Springs will be closed to southbound traffic between Reading Road and Dana Avenue. Dana Avenue will be closed to westbound traffic between Clinton Springs Avenue and Reading Road. The northbound left turn restriction at Clinton Springs Avenue and Reading Road will be lifted during this phase.
- Curb work on Mitchell
- Curb work and paving on Clinton Springs
- Rebuild the retaining wall on the north side of Clinton Springs across from the play fields.
- Other small curb and road fixes have been going on through the Stop Investiture Repair Program. *Thank you for the work on Avondale Ave.!*
- The project construction schedule:
  - The final surface course is scheduled to be placed the week of December 14<sup>th</sup>. Leading up to this is the wall repair at Clinton Springs near Leyman and casting adjustments.
  - There will be a punch list of items not completed by that date that will be completed in the spring.
