Accomplishments

NANA submitted their Cincinnati Budget Request (CBR) and NANA Pedestrian Safety Committee Requests

Safety Study Project Name :Safer Streets and traffic Flow

There are two (2) intersections within the neighborhood that could be improved and made safer with minor maintenance.

1. Mitchell Ave at Red Bud Ave. As traffic flows east on Mitchell, there is a sharp curve with a traffic signal shortly after the curve. There exists a flashing light overhead alerting traffic that the traffic light is turning red but it is completely covered by overgrown trees. There are frequent accidents at this intersection as drivers are surprised by traffic stopped at the light. We ask that the trees be trimmed along Mitchell from Ardmore to Red Bud and consistently maintained going forward.

2. As traffic flows west on Dana Ave from Victory Pkwy there are two travel lanes. Once past the sharp curve at Winding Way the curb lane ends and parking becomes legal. Drivers are surprised at this sudden reduction in driving lanes and are forced to merge. Frequently these drivers are traveling at a rate of speed higher than posted. This 'surprise' causes panic braking, traffic congestion and aggravation with all drivers. We propose that the curb lane on west bound Dana be marked as right turn only and force drivers to turn right onto Winding Way. Right turn arrows should be painted on

the pavement and appropriate signage as needed.
Estimated cost \$1,500.00

Seasongood Park Improvements (*See Beautification for more*)

- Rebuild landscaping walls that front Clinton Springs
- Install additional water access

BEAUTIFICATION

Fall is here and it's time to prepare the beds for winter and get the last installation planted for next year.

On October 20th at 1 pm there will be a **Tree Dedication Memorial Service for Marvin Masterson**. The community room in the Belvedere is reserved for our community social from 1 to 3 pm in Marvin's honor. Marvin was without a doubt filled to the brim with enthusiasm. His enthusiasm was infectious. It was a great experience to work together with Marvin on the NANA Board, with Congressman Steve Chabot, City Council Members, City Administration, Avondale 29, and many other communities. I will never forget "my friend."

We are getting ready for spring in **Seasongood Square Park**. I have larkspur seeds to sow and Tulip bulbs to plant too. These were given to me by a gardening friend to plant in our neighborhood park. In addition we will add some plants to the corner bed. It will pop with color next year. The **Community Budget Request** for Seasongood Square Park improvements has been submitted to the City. Maura Wolf contributed a lot of the information and specified what is needed. There has been inadequate water flow coming through the irrigation for the past 3 or 4 years, ugh. We are requesting again to add a water service line and meter at the northeast end of Seasongood Square Park. This long outstanding request is necessary to maintain the park flower beds. The current irrigation lines coming from the southern end of the park (over 500 feet) have tree roots growing into the lines restricting the waterflow. The other request is to replace and repair the concrete block and the stone walls along Clinton Springs Ave. with consistency and sustainability. With blocks visibly detached, these crumbling walls are unsafe and not consistent with the esthetics of the neighborhood and need improvement.

All of the gardens in the neighborhood public places look good. **Many thanks to our expert volunteer gardeners!** There's no doubt that Dana/Victory Parkway Gardens are stunning and burst with color. Once the Gateway Sign is installed the Triangle will be so beautiful with a beautiful strong gateway entrance to our neighborhood. In addition to the sign there will be 2 very large pots to flank each end of the wall. These pots we're given to our neighborhood through Keep Cincinnati Beautiful. Thank you so much Keep Cincinnati Beautiful.

This reminds me to ask all of you to donate to the flower pot fund. Our Reading Rd corridor looks very nice; the urns at Mitchell and Red Bud are bursting with beauty too.

HEALTH & WELLNESS

Mental Health: Part 2 of Summer 2018

There are many dimensions to health (physical, emotional, spiritual, mental). Our common focus is on our physical health and we demonstrate that through regular doctor visits. We check each other's emotional health when we plaster "Keep Calm" emoji as responses to anger. Many of our churches, temples, mosques and synagogues satisfy our spiritual health. The mental aspect of our health is the one that needs the most tending to and is the one that society has confirmed "untouchable". With each passing day it becomes more and more clear that mental health must be on the table and open for discussion in every home and organization. Poor mental health is not discriminatory. It rears its head in every family regardless of race, creed, religion or color. Because most of us are unconscious of the effects of events in our childhood, we had the experience and we kept moving. Because the experience may not have been checked, it found a hiding place and decided to grow and cause havoc throughout our life (most times the source of the havoc is unknown.) If it never got the needed attention, it developed a pattern and appeared periodically. The consequences of unattended mental health cross the entire spectrum – from "no effect" to the "most tragic effects (suicide, homicide,...)

Many times receiving adequate healthcare means navigating disjointed resources and systems. Receiving professional mental health services can mean travelling to a facility that may be separate from facilities that address traditional concerns (diabetes, high blood pressure, etc.). Sometimes you might travel from one end of the city to the other end. It is easy to avoid the hassle and just not go. The Cincinnati Health Department wishes to reduce the barriers that prevent us from accessing the care we need. The Health Department recognizes mental health as of equal value to physical health. Therefore there are four Health Centers which provide behavioral health services alongside traditional health services: Northside, North Fairmount, Braxton Cann, and Elm Street. Utilize the services!

Good Morning Greater Cincinnati, The Mill Creek Alliance (MCA) has worked for over 20 years to restore and improve the Mill Creek Watershed and the quality of life for all of its residents. MCA invites you to a special Council of Communities' meeting where elected officials and other community leaders can learn more about a crucial Mill Creek watershed issue that will impact all residents of the watershed.

The Millcreek Valley Conservancy District ("District") has inherited responsibility for overseeing and maintaining many parcels of land along the Mill Creek from the US Army Corps of Engineers. While this in itself is an important and daunting task, the District would also like to acquire title or conservation easements to additional land in the watershed to utilize and manage for conservation, storm water, and flood water control purposes. This could extend many benefits to the stream and all of our communities.

Unfortunately, the Corps of Engineers does not provide

funding to the District for these activities. Instead, the District is empowered by law to levy an assessment or property tax on property owners in the watershed in order to fund this necessary work. The proposed assessment must be approved by a Hamilton County Common Pleas Court Judge. The District is in the process of examining several options for the basis and structure of the assessment and would like to discuss it with as many community leaders as possible.

Since the Mill Creek Alliance is active throughout the watershed and has an existing Council of Communities structure in place, the District asked MCA to assist in arranging an opportunity for it to present its plans. Therefore, MCA has arranged a meeting to be held **October 18, 2018 from 4:00 - 6:00 pm at the Sharonville Convention Center**. Tim Gilday, Board Chair for the District, and representatives from the District's engineering consultant, Stantec, will describe the District's plans and answer questions from the public.

MCA hopes that you will be able to attend this special event, take advantage of the opportunity to network with many other community leaders, and learn more about the Mill Creek Watershed, the District and the potential assessment. This last term refers to the presence of at least one child under 18 years old, and also protects prospects and tenants who are pregnant or in the process of adopting a child.

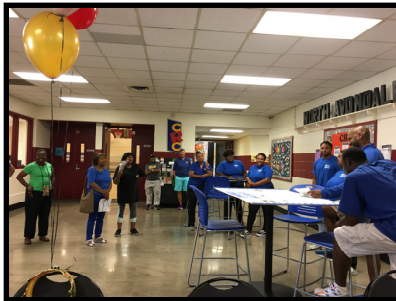

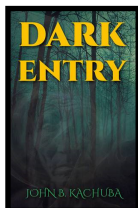

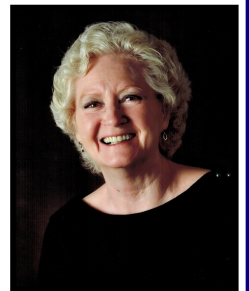
