PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As confirmed at our recent General meetings, North Avondale residents would like to see our business district revitalized. I'm pleased to report on our progress in applying for two 2013 Cincinnati Neighborhood Business District Improvement Program grants. We've completed the final step, which involved presentations for grants to: (1) improve our cornerstone lot located on Reading Road between Avondale Avenue and Barry Lane (now owned by the City) and (2) enhance safety in the business district. The Cincinnati Neighborhood Business District United (CNBDU) impressively facilitates the grant submission process and fosters mentoring and collaboration among leaders to improve our city's neighborhood business districts. When you enjoy improvements around the city, please know there are many dedicated volunteers behind the scenes working with city officials to make positive change.

A special thanks to Michelle Baxter, Law and Safety Chair, for a great job at presenting our safety grant as well as to Tina Dyehouse, Strategic Planning Co-Chair; Charlene Morse, Administrator; and Vanessa Sorensen, graphic designer, for their support throughout this process. Competition is extremely tough with only approximately \$1.8 million available for \$3.8 million in requests. Many of us feel the city should allocate more funds for these worthwhile projects to spur economic activity and to achieve the goals in Plan Cincinnati for our neighborhood centers.

Our Membership Committee Chair Carolyn Gillman, along with a special working group of neighbors and members of our Business Association, are planning the first annual North Avondale Connects! event to take place on Sunday, October 28th from 2:30 PM to 5:00 PM at Seasongood Park. Please come connect! (see top right hand column for more details).

The NANA Beautification Committee made great strides on clearing the Washington/Clinton Springs triangle. We are extremely grateful to Beth Ewing, who is coordinating the efforts and creating a sustainable plan, as well as to the participating neighbors, including 10 Xavier students (please see list of volunteers for this and other events on page 6). In addition, the year-long work of our gardeners is commended as we all enjoy the beautiful adopt-a-plot gardens at the Dana Triangle, Seasongood Park and Marion. A special thanks to Julie Zimmerman for drafting the grant submissions to Keep Cincinnati Beautiful for our Dana Triangle gardens.

Don't miss our upcoming General Meeting at 7pm this Tuesday, October 9th at the NA Recreation Center, when we will hear from several of our committees about ongoing projects and exciting new initiatives.

A special thank you **Captain Elliot Isaacs** for a great job as our District Commander over the last five years. He was the first Captain citywide to implement the Chronic Nuisance Ordinance while working closely with Michelle Baxter, chair of the Landlord Accountability (now Law & Safety Committee). We wish him well as Criminal Investigations Section Commander.

Welcome to Captain Daniel W. Gerard, M.S. He is a 27 year veteran of the Cincinnati, Ohio Police Department (CPD), and Deputy Director of the University of Cincinnati's Institute of Crime Science. He received his B.S. and M.S. in Criminal Justice from the University of Cincinnati, is a graduate of the Southern Policing Institute at the University of Louisville, and completed the Senior Management Institute for Police offered by the Police Executive Research Forum. Captain Gerard currently serves as the CPD Commander for District Four.

He is a member of the International Association of Chiefs of Police (IACP) National Highway Safety Committee, and he also chairs both the Ohio/Kentucky Regional Incident Management Task Force and the Cincinnati Initiative to Reduce Violence (CIRV) Law Enforcement Team. The CIRV effort resulted in a 41% reduction in gang-member involved homicides over a 42-month period, and the CIRV Law Enforcement Team was awarded the 2008 National Criminal Justice Association's Outstanding Criminal Justice Program Award, the 2008 IACP /Motorola Webber Seavey Award for Quality in Law Enforcement, and the 2009 IACP/West Award for Excellence in Criminal Investigations.


AROUND THE NEIGHBORHOOD

The Metropolitan Sewer District of Greater Cincinnati (MSD) is currently undertaking a study of the existing sewer system in portions of the Avondale and North Avondale neighborhoods. A map of the project study area is attached. The purpose of this study is to better understand the current capacity and condition of the existing sewer system and identify conceptual alternatives for improvements.

MSD field crews will be in your neighborhood during daylight hours televising existing sewer segments, conducting sewer manhole inspections and performing field verifications periodically during the months of October and November 2012 (including weekdays and weekends). The majority of this work will take place within the right of way. Residents will receive door hangers a minimum of one day in advance of activities taking place on private property. An example door hanger is attached for your reference.



Good News! Preliminary Ohio report cards are out and South Avondale is designated as EXCELLENT. The 6 designations are: Excellent with Distinction, Excellent, Effective, Continuous Improvement, Academic Watch, and Academic Emergency. South Avondale was in Academic Emergency for 10 years before it became a Turn Around school. The first year of Turn Around it missed changing that by just one subject in one grade. The 2nd year it was designated Effective, a jump of 3 categories. The 3rd year, with the scores we see now, it has achieved the Excellent category. AYP means meeting the indicators set by the state for specific grades and subjects. In the past 2 years South Avondale has achieved AYP and value-added. Value-added means achieving more growth (or less) than these standards. This is very difficult to do. It is being accomplished due to the great efforts and team work of the teaching staff under the leadership of Mrs. Macon.



adaptive habits of plants and animals from fall to winter and from winter to spring.
