NEIGHBORHOOD ISSUE

Hello Neighbors,

The New School Montessori has been a part of the North Avondale neighborhood for over 50 years! During that time we have been honored to serve many North Avondale families as their



school of choice, promoting a holistic education with a focus on diversity, environmental stewardship, peace education, and the Montessori philosophy. The school has hosted North Avondale community events and for a while was a meeting space for the North Avondale Neighborhood Association. We love this neighborhood and are grateful for the surrounding community.

We understand that our school, situated in a quiet residential neighborhood, has an impact on traffic, parking, and the bustle from the occasional outdoor event. We are committed to limiting the impact as well as building neighborhood relationships. One way we have intentionally limited our impact is through keeping our enrollment to roughly 150 students for decades.

There are two developments happening we want to make you aware of and hopefully highlight the mutual benefits to The New School Montessori and our North Avondale neighbors. We also welcome your feedback as we go through the planning process.

One is our recent purchase of 33 Burton Woods Lane. This property is immediately adjacent to our building at 29 Burton Woods Lane. The sellers are a New School Montessori alumni family and they offered the property as a partial donation. Due to the family being spread out throughout the country, the house had been neglected. We believe it would have been a challenge for the sellers to find someone willing to invest what would have been needed to renovate. We came to an agreement after sharing our plans to raze the house and create more natural space. There are no plans to build any type of structure on this property. We intend to plant trees, grow grass, and increase the natural beauty of our campus and neighborhood. Our purchase, we feel, was a win-win for the neighborhood and our school.

The other development is the current New School Montessori capital campaign called the Kaleidoscope Campaign: A Beautiful Vision. One aspect of the campaign is to increase our Diversity Endowment to further support families at our school. Currently 25% of our community receives aid. We would love to create more opportunities for inquiring families, including families from the North Avondale area.

The other component to the Kaleidoscope Campaign is to address the challenge presented by our Annex building (the old church). After inspections by different architectural firms we were informed that it has lived beyond its architectural intent. As a result The New School Montessori began to have conversations around how to renovate or build new. We looked at this challenge as an opportunity to further our commitment to the arts, environmental stewardship, and community dialogue. With a new building we could fully align our mission and values through innovative earth-friendly design. The new building's purpose would be to deepen the educational experiences for our students, not increase enrollment.

The new building (the Kaleidoscope Center) will also allow The New School Montessori to redesign our campus layout in a way that increases the natural space and opens a "greener" visual experience for our neighbors. The Annex would be razed and The Kaleidoscope Center would be pulled back to sit closer to the Mitchell Mansion.

We are very excited about these plans and are eager to share more information. We would also like to hear your concerns, and answer any questions to the best of our ability.

On Thursday February 17 (a) 6:30 we would like to invite NANA and residents from Burton Woods Lane to join us for a ZOOM town hall meeting. This is to inform you that as of the January 2022 meeting of the North Avondale Joint Strategic Planning Committee (NA JSDC), there is no longer a chair person of the Committee. After serving out a year with Jeff Herr as co-chair, we no longer have personal capacity. Nor did anyone volunteer to keep the Committee running until such time that a new chair can be found. As NANA/ NABA look for replacements and future direction of the Committee, I leave you with some observations and suggestions.

The majority of the Committee members are involved to gather info/have their voice heard but do not have time to serve as working committee members. Of the 30+ committee members, only 15 ever attended a committee call. Only four committee members were able to help the chairs with any tasks. Net, I think it is fair to say the group functioned as a non-working board offering oversight, not as a working committee.

To be successful, and attract a new chair(s), the Committee should be made up of contributing members with defined responsibilities. This will also serve to recruit Committee members. The JSDC should also move forward with hiring a consultant to provide professional help and work with the Committee members on their areas.

The body of work undertaken by the Committee could be defined as follows:

Chair(s)

- Preside over meetings
- Oversee work of sub committees
- Oversee work of paid consultants, including securement
- City / Port primary liaison

Admin

- Take minutes
- Schedule meetings
- Maintain repository of documents
- Maintain any budgets required

Development

• Work with consultants, Committee, gov't leaders and developers to spur new development in business

corridor including creation of official positions on development

Zoning

• Work with Committee, consultant, NANA, NABA and gov't leaders to enforce and define zoning changes, questions and enforcement

Community Engagement

- Work with NANA, NABA, consultant and gov't officials to lead community engagement as it relates to development and zoning changes
- Prepare monthly committee update for NANA News

I think if the Committee is limited to a subgroup of people with 1-2 people working in each of these capacities (ie maybe 10 members), it would have a significantly increased chance of success.

There are currently no open items within the Committee outside of finding a consultant. The purchase option on 3864 Reading does not expire until the end of March, at which time there stands to be a fair amount of work either with community engagement on the current applicant or finding a new viable buyer.

The Victory Parkway Bridge was built in 1917 to replace a truss bridge and to provide a more pleasing view as you enter Eden Park. Although the bridge isn't anything to write



home about while driving along from above, the real beauty is of the architecture from below. The bridge which is 472 feet and spans Kemper Lane, was rehabilitated in 1939 when cantilevered sidewalks and balustrades were added. LONGEVITY IN NORTH AVONDALE

An ongoing project to record our history from those who have lived in the neighborhood the longest! Please reach out to me, Jolene Struebbe, <u>imstruebbe@gmail.com</u> if you would like to tell your family story. This month, as I kick off this project, I am so excited to introduce two "longevity" families and share their stories of living in North Avondale. You will learn about Ernest Fontana & Nelida Mietta-Fontana at 3950 Ledgewood and Bob & Mary Wells at 4245 Rose Hill.

Ernest Fontana and his wife, Nelida Mietta-Fontana, met in graduate school at the University of Notre Dame. They moved to Cincinnati in 1966 and lived for a

brief while in Swifton Village. In August 1968 they rented at the Park Lane on Victory Parkway and began their tenure in North Avondale. They then moved to their current location at **3950 Ledgewood (which was built in 1925) in August 1970,** where they rented from



their friend, Richard Meister, until they bought the house from him in May 1971. They paid \$19,500 for the house and recall having an 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ % interest rate!

Ernest and Nelida were both involved in education. Ernest was a professor at XU and ultimately became the chair of the English Department at Xavier. Nelida was a public-school teacher and ultimately a principal. North Avondale was attractive for many reasons for the young couple, but initially because it allowed Ernest to walk to work and they could get by with one car. They describe their home as a middle-class house, vet a serious upgrade, almost "Baronial" Ernest says, compared to homes they lived in as children - Ernest in Little Italy in Cleveland and Nelida in Argentina. And, to this day, they love that North Avondale is close to downtown and the hospitals, is aesthetically pleasing and has "housing that cannot be duplicated"! As an aside, they mention that North Avondale is especially good for older people as recently it only took them 6 minutes by car to get to the hospital for a medical concern! They love that they have a "nature preserve" in the backyard-deer, birds and more! "It is a paradox to live in the middle of the city and have all of this nature surround us", Ernest says!

They have two children, a son born while they lived in Park Lane and a daughter who was born on Ledgewood. The children both went to Xavier Lab School, then the North Avondale School and onto Walnut Hills. At this time, the North Avondale school was a neighborhood school and the children knew and played with children all across North Avondale. (Once the school became a magnet school it lessened these contacts.) They recall that there were many black and white children, as well as Catholic and Jews on the street, that all went to school together. Their son, who now teaches Black and Hispanic children in the Chicago area, feels that his experience at North Avondale School and in the neighborhood set the foundation for him to be successful with the diversity in his classroom today. Nelida says they had "a great childhood", sometimes outside all day playing, only coming in for lunch.

attend monthly NANA meetings. Today, Nelida remains active in the neighborhood book club.

Over the years they say North Avondale has become more upscale. It is not as integrated. They recall Jewish families, however, leading the campaign to avoid "white flight". Today they say the neighborhood is still mixed, it just that the "categories" have changed. There are many more LGBTQIA+. It is wonderful that North Avondale continues to be welcoming to all.

Ernest was fortunate to pick up a great book at the Cincinnati Art Museum book sale, published by the Williams Co., titled "Ohioans of Today". He says half the book is about Cleveland, where he is from and ½ about Cincinnati- North Avondale! I know, that I, for one, am looking forward to taking a look at this book soon!! (PS There is also a graduate thesis published by a graduate student at XU on The History of North Avondale. More information on this when I return to Cincinnati in April and can share details of the author.)

Now, for Bob and Mary Wells

Bob and Mary Wells, lived in Cleveland where Bob got a Ph.D. at Case Western. They moved to Fairfield in November

of 1972 when Bob got a Job with P&G at Miami Valley Labs. Mary has a Masters in Special Education from Columbia and worked in Cleveland, and then subbed in Cincinnati. One day, while watching TV, Mary saw people in North



Avondale discussing a project and they leaned very liberal. Mary liked and noticed this. Concurrently, a coworker of Bob's lived on Beechwood Ave. and invited them to a party. They went "nuts" at the architecture, the spacing of the houses, and the trees!! (As a side note, this "friend", lived at the current Xavier President's house and he paid \$20,000 for the house a few years earlier!)

There were plenty of houses for sale when Bob and Mary decided North Avondale was for them. The riots had occurred in South Avondale and houses were very cheap. They loved North Avondale from the get go! Their house has style, large closets, nice yard and a big basement! Bob and Mary closed on their dream house at **4245 Rose Hill Avenue** on July 6, 1973. They paid \$35,000 for the house.

Over the years, Mary was very involved in North Avondale. She was the editor of NANA News, and was the Treasurer of the Clinton Hills Swim Club. In the 1980's she was part of the "Sanctuary Movement" housing refugees from El Salvador at the Quaker House. She continues to be part of a neighborhood book club.

In the time Mary and Bob have been in North Avondale, they have noticed that the houses have become a lot more expensive and the people have become younger (HA)! When they moved in, they were surrounded by "medical" people. There were lots of psychiatrists then, but fewer today.

Bob notes that the streets of North Avondale used to be paved in wood blocks! He has several that he has collected as the streets have been renovated. He says the wood blocks date back to horse and buggy times. In fact, he can remember being told that in the early 1900's Saturday nights meant carriages lined up on Beechwood Avenue with visitors and *(Continued on page 7)*
