SAFETY IN NORTH AVONDALE WHAT CAN YOU DO?

THE INCIDENT: A New School parent attended the Auction alone on Saturday, March 4. Prior to leaving about 9:45 p.m., he loaded his wife's mini-van with articles donated to highlight her work. He then got into his vehicle parked near the lower portion of the staff driveway. Upon starting the vehicle and beginning to back down the drive, the parent observed a single individual with a handgun, dressed in dark clothing with a hood and ski mask, exit the wooded area behind a currently vacant "For Sale" home on Clinton Springs Ave. that backs up to the staff drive. The individual grabbed for the vehicle's door handle but was unable to open it as it was locked. The parent swung his vehicle around as he entered Burton Woods Lane. It was at that time that the individual fired his weapon striking the passenger door. Thinking quickly, the parent called 911 and drove back to The New School via Red Bud and Burton Woods Lane and cautioned others to remain inside until the police arrived. Other than being shaken, neither the parent nor anyone else was injured in the incident.

INSIGHT:At the March 14 NANA Meeting The New School Administrators and District 4 Police came to discuss the situation. The police think it was a crime of opportunity and asked to be notified of future functions/events and they will provide more security. The New School has cleaned out the honeysuckle and underbrush along the driveway and is putting in fencing. The New School is also planning on providing security at future events.

Zakia McKinney of Xavier's Community Building Institute is assisting CPS in formulating our vision of Burton School's future. Zakia reviewed the results of a project that took place several years ago involving all 4 schools in the area. Many of our residents participated in this vision of the facility plan. The vision called for a different community focus or added emphasis for each school, and a sharing of the facilities among the schools. Rockdale - Health, South Avondale - Sports, Burton - Science, North Avondale Montessori - Arts.

CPS has 13 acres behind the present Burton school. This has great potential to be a land lab. Our evolved vision for Burton is a High Performance School Building (better learning environment for students and teachers, costs less to operate, & helps protect the environment) with a focus on science and a land lab that supports the science standards and environmental learning.

Burton School is North Avondale's Neighborhood School and as CPS is still making adjustments in their facilities plan we need to convince them of the wisdom of our vision so that we do not lose our neighborhood school as Clifton did. Regular yard waste collection resumes April 3, 2006

- Remember: To place yard waste at your curb by 6AM on your regular trash collection day beside your household trash and green recycling bin. Yard waste in plastic bags will not be collected. You can use trash cans as long as they are CLEARLY MARKED "YARD WASTE."
- •Branches and brush should be tied into bundles no larger than 2 ft. x 4 ft. and individual tree limbs should be no larger than 6 inches in diameter.

Making Landlords Accountable

NANA supports making landlords accountable for problems on their properties as defined by the Ohio Revised Code. Being a Landlord is a business and it impacts the neighborhoods where the properties are located.

The problems in neighborhoods are generally connected to rental property, not because renters are bad neighbors, but because landlords don't follow good rental policies. Good rental policies start with screening. Correcting the problem often means evicting the problem tenants and the landlord doesn't want to lose that income. We have good landlords in our neighborhoods but we don't hear about them because they are managing their business well. Owners who can't do this need to learn how to do it right or get out of the business. NANA has been advocating this policy for over 5 years, has a packet available for landlords & tenants and is glad to see city council is getting serious with this issue.



NEIGHBORHOOD SOLUTIONS: Another option discussed was forming a **Citizens on Patrol Program** (COPP) in North Avondale. Volunteers patrol their neighborhoods, acting as the eyes and ears of the police by using police radios and cell phones to communicate directly with officers and report crimes in progress. Much of the COPP unit's function, however, is the reporting of quality-of-life issues. By locating and reporting issues that contribute to criminal activity, these teams are able to fix the proverbial "Broken Window." All members complete a basic class of 12-hours training and attend additional ongoing training throughout the year. In North Avondale we already have lots of walkers so the idea was discussed to have walkers go through the training. We can also all keep our eyes open to suspicious behavior. Suspicious behavior may include the following actions: *Unfamiliar persons loitering in your neighborhood (around schools, parks, businesses, homes etc)*Non resident entering someone's house or building *Jumping a fence into a yard or private property *Waiting in front of a house when owners are gone *Peering into vehicles or attempting to open it *Entering or leaving a business after hours *Soliciting door to door, refusing to present identification or business license *Forcing entry or tampering with doors and windows of vehicles, business, or residence *Running while holding something of value *Slow moving vehicles circling the block *Unfamiliar parked vehicles, especially when someone's in them *A person expressing oneself uncontrollably as if controlled by substance abuse *Unusual noises, screams, glass breaking, barking dogs, etc.*If you see a crime being committed, are the victim of a crime, or observe suspicious activity, report it immediately and accurately. *Do not assume someone else has called the police. *Do not hesitate – even a five minute delay in reporting can greatly reduce the chance of catching a criminal. *Creating a police record is important. *Write down everything you can remember with detailed. description of persons and vehicles. Call Emergency -911 (Crime in progress, serous injuries); Non Emergency Police dispatch - 765-1212; District Four 352-3576.
