Michelle Baxter 1st Vice President /Chair of Landlord Accountability has dedicated her service to CMC 761 Chronic Nuisance Ordinance. NANA embraced this Ordinance since it was championed by Council Member Jeff Berding in 2006. NANA has lobbied City Council for 3 years and diligently worked with the Cincinnati Police department to see this effective tool properly enforced in NA and throughout the City to hold irresponsible landlords accountable for crime and disorder on their premises.

This has been a unified effort through the Community Driven Crime Control Coalition of Neighborhoods which are NA, Bond Hill, OTR, West End, Westwood, Pendleton.

REMINDER: THE 2010 PIG ROAST COULD BE COMING TO A HOUSE NEAR YOU.

Take action if you see any indication of an off-campus party. The "Pig Roast" usually occurs in the Spring, near the end of the school year at Xavier. Norwood, North Avondale, or Evanston (in walking distance) are likely to have the event this year. The Rental Housing committee recommends:

- Watch for signs of preparations for a party.
- Call then and warn the local police and the campus police.
- Call again and repeatedly when there are disturbances and/or signs of illegal activity.
- Calls to the police will be prioritized but make it clear, courteously, that it is important to the neighborhood that all possible action be taken as indicated.

CITIZEN'S ON PATROL PROGRAM AND YOU

Neighborhoods have always been Cincinnati's greatest strength; North Avondale being near the top. However, these days, as Cincinnati is facing huge budgetary shortfalls, it means that we must all be even more involved in order to maintain the quality of life we so value in North Avondale.

A perfect way for involving yourself with your neighborhood is through the North Avondale Citizens on Patrol (CoPP). CoPP is a volunteer group which is sanctioned and sponsored by the Cincinnati Police Department. 1500 members strong and active in almost every community of the city CoPP conducts daytime and evening neighborhood walking and driving patrols.

As eyes and ears to the Police Department CoPPs call in observed incidents. Reporting to the proper city agencies CoPPs request corrective action on situations affecting our quality of life—junk vehicles, littering, weeds, spray painting, broken street lights, and imminent safety issues. Former New York City Mayor Rudy Giuliani inherited a city in turmoil and quickly implemented his "broken window" theory; address even the smallest items as a way to stave off increasingly bigger issues.

CoPP volunteers are trained by Cincinnati Police officers. Patrols are safely conducted in groups of three and in provided uniforms. Each patrol normally is scheduled to last about 3 hours. We're looking for people who can commit being a member on two patrols a month.

The City Council Meeting held on April 7, 2010, Council member Charlie Winburn submitted the following motion on behalf NA and the CDCC Coalition.

■ MOTION, # 201000510 (AMENDED) dated 4/7/2010 submitted by Councilmembers Winburn, Ghiz, Monzel and Berding that the City Council direct the City Manager to utilize Cincinnati Municipal Code Chapter 761-Chronic Nuisance Premises in order to achieve the intended purpose of the law and ultimately the intended outcomes, which is to abate such problems in Cincinnati within the next 24 months. WE FURTHER MOVE that the City Council direct the City Manager to provide a report explaining the City Administration's enforcement policy for Chapter 761-Chronic Nuisance Premises and enforcement progress on the following questions... Click to view the rest of the motion on the City Web site. This motion would have never been possible without the help off Winburn's ongoing efforts. This motion was unanimously supported by the NANA Executive Board before taking to full council. City Council mandated this motion. The City Council vote was 6-3 in favor to support the motion.

Preservation Association will present its annual "Upstairs, Downstairs" Historic House Tour showcasing architecturally significant buildings in Walnut Hills. The event is planned by CPA's House Tour Committee. Chaired by CPA Trustee Mary Piper (Avondale Ave.). Among the houses this year are the former Pogue Mansion and the Bernard H. Moormann House. The Bernard H. Moormann house was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973. Also on the tour is the former home and studio of artists Herman and Bessie Wessel, a condo in one of the city's historic luxury apartment buildings, and a mansion that overlooks the Ohio River.
