
Representatives from Bond Hill and North Avondale will be hosting one of the break out sessions!

NANA'S FOLLOW UP MEETING WITH THE CITY

On Thursday, January 24, 2008 Gerry & Marvin Kraus, Charlene Morse & John W. Jones from NANA met with Assistant City Mgr Scott Stiles, Captain Isaac, Joel Koopman, & Mike Cervay to receive updates on our Sept. 24 meeting. **Updates:**

- Captain Isaac, crime stats are down in every category. Crime is down 21% overall, with a 20% decrease since last year.
 - •A couple of initiatives were implemented to try to deal with the Mini Mart on Burton: marking the tires to ticket for overtime parking (they countered by moving the van across the street) Street sweeping (which resulted in it being towed), and a citation for not having the vendors license displayed.
 - ■Better solution: The Law & Public Safety committee is pursuing an ordinance to make it illegal for a vehicle to park at the curb to sell goods. Legal will report back in 30 days.
 - Another area of concern, is that tractor trailer cabs are being parked on residential streets over the week end, Captain Isaac will follow up.
- Gershuny Property have back taxes been paid yet if not, contact the county prosecutor to institute foreclosure procedures.
- Streetscape finally went out for bid in January, so construction on Reading Rd. from Dana to Lenox should begin this spring.
- Armory State has yet to offer it to the City.
- Fire Station moved on January 24. A decision on the use for the property has yet to be determined. The property will first be offered for municipal use, then community development use. Marvin asked if City could rent it to the Business District for a \$1/yr. We would not like to see the property become derelict, which would have a negative. An African firefighters group has expressed an interest in the site. We asked to be kept informed as to the status
- Chronic Nuisance Ordinance and its lack of enforcement was discussed. The goal is to get the worst owners to engage with the police but is new and needs some of the kinks ironed out.

In three weeks we should receive a follow-up from Rick Hardy.

NANA NOTATIONS

FRONT YARD PARKING IS ILLEGAL. The City of Cincinnati Municipal Code, Section 511-33, prohibits the parking of any vehicle on any unpaved portion of a residential front yard. Section 511-31 of the Code...prohibits parking of or storing of an unlicensed or inoperable vehicle on residential or commercial property for more than three days in a place of open view. Large commercial trucks (like 18-wheelers) are also prohibited from parking on residential streets. Call 765-1212, the Nonemergency Police number, if you believe a vehicle on your street is parked illegally. Call the NANA Office at 221-6166 if the problem continues.

RECYCLE AT COMMUNITY CENTER, 617 Clinton Springs. Apartment dwellers and others: you can still recycle even if your building does not participate in the City's curbside recycling program. Bring your recyclables to the Recycling Container at the end of the Community Center's parking area. A list of what is recyclable is posted on the container. And thanks to NANA's purchase a visible sign under the Center sign will point you in the right direction.
