VICTORY PARKWAY UPDATE by Gerry Kraus

On Saturday morning, November 13, about 35 neighbors gathered on Victory Parkway to protest against any further clear-cutting to make way for Xavier University developments and to get ideas on what to do about the perceived damage already done. Those gathered formed themselves into the *ad boc* Victory Parkway Action Committee (V-PAC) to be co-ordinated by George Brockman, Jim Faulkner and Gale Howe (pictured above). The committee agreed to ask City Council to:

- prohibit any further clearing of the barrier strip that was designed to block the view of the planned sports field and tennis courts;
- require additional plantings to screen the Cintas Center from view;
- require the planting of tall mature trees to fill in the gaps created along the buffer zone;
- eliminate the nature trail which, if developed, will further thin the buffer zone;
- eliminate the 8-foot wide paved walkway into the area from Victory Parkway at Ledgewood Drive;
- provide for follow-up to insure Xavier fulfills these obligations and maintains and replaces the green growth as needed.

These requests were presented to City Council's Neighborhood, Small Business & Environment Committee on November 16. Among the North Avondale residents speaking were Darryl Brown, Gale Howe, Marvin Kraus, Jim Faulkner and Glenna Kennedy. Also speaking were John Cole, an XU graduate from College Hill, who called for a city -wide review of green space preservation as Mt. Airy is experiencing similar green space loss in Mt. Airy Forest and Norwood resident Sonia Simpson who stated that the green space loss along Victory Parkway was also adversely affecting Norwood. Xavier University Vice President John Kucia stated that Xavier had met with the community for over two years in developing this project; that Xavier has continued to work with residents, NANA and the Park Board to address additional concerns raised by its construction activities; and that Xavier is committed to making the Victory Parkway buffer thicker and taller to minimize the negative visual impact residents are complaining about. Park Board representative Dave Prather said that a preliminary revised landscaping plan has been prepared to address many of the neighborhood concerns expressed at a meeting held on November 9 with Cincinnati Park Board staff, Xavier University representatives and North Avondale residents. At that meeting the group had worked through several issues. All agreed that:

- no additional tree clearing would occur with the exception of mulch removal;
- Xavier's developer would prepare a new Buffer Plan concept that would include recommendations to screen out the views from Victory Parkway to the Cintas Center, the Cohen parking area and its hill, the drainage area between the Cohen lot and Webster Avenue and the commercial buildings on Webster Avenue - also the new buffer plan would include consideration of lighting issues;
- Xavier will reallocate funds to introduce larger plant material in key areas to screen the exposed views listed above;
- an update on the status of the sewer would be obtained from MSD (Metropolitan Sewer District);
- there would be a follow-up meeting, organized by Park Board staff and to take place after Thanksgiving, to review the new Buffer Plan concept.



Still unresolved to date were issues regarding maintaining the honeysuckle in the buffer zone along Victory Parkway, having a paved entrance through the buffer zone to the recreational development and the construction of a nature path within the buffer zone. The Park Board has agreed to maintain 90% of the honeysuckle within the buffer area but the residents want 100% of the honeysuckle to remain. Also the residents do not want the buffer zone to be breached with any entryway along Victory Parkway or along Ledgewood Drive, which would further exacerbate current parking problems in the neighborhood. Xavier is agreeable to reducing the width of the nature path from 7 feet to 3 feet but the residents do not want any nature path constructed within the buffer zone.

A follow-up meeting with the Park Board, Xavier and neighborhood residents is scheduled to take place on (Continued on page 3)

December 7 at which time the new proposed Buffer Plan will be reviewed. A report on this meeting, as well as any possible further actions by NANA, will be on the agenda at NANA's monthly meeting on January 11.

REVERSE THE BLIGHT By Pauline Daly

This month we have been dealing with raccoons and would like to share what we have learned. The biggest attraction for raccoons is garbage and it is necessary that you make it so difficult for them that they will go somewhere else. By law the garbage cans should have tight lids. You may need to put something heavy on the lid so these animals can't lift the lid off. They will rip open garbage bags that contain food scraps.

If raccoons are in your building, usually in the attic, repairs will need to be made to keep them out. Ammonia soaked rags placed in the space they enter can discourage them from staying. Take action as soon as you are aware of the raccoons or you may find you have a colony living there. Raccoons can be dangerous and could have rabies. Avoid either people or pets who have been in contact with them.

Update: Problems involving student housing near Marion and Dakota have improved with the cooperation from the neighbors, Xavier, the police, and the students. Some Norwood residents have expressed an interest in the process and the Resident's Packet. We were glad to share it with them. Home owners on Dana have also been given this information. Remember if you don't voice your objection to disorderly behavior, it is considered permission to continue. NANA asks that all student residents behave as you would in your parents' neighborhood.

P.S. We had an example of childish, acting out behavior the weekend of Nov. 12/13. Mum plants were pulled out of the circle at Marion and Dakota and dropped in the street to die.
