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NAME CHANGE ANGERS GLENWOOD RESIDENTS by Gerry Kraus

The residents of Glenwood Avenue are angry...and they feel betrayed by their City government. Why? Because on November 28, 2001, at the last meeting of the previous City Council, without any notice to residents, Council passed a resolution (5-3) to change the name of Glenwood Avenue to L. Venchael Booth Avenue. When the renaming of Glenwood Avenue first came up last February, 2001, the City's Committee on Street Renaming surveyed the Glenwood Ave. residents, businesses and churches to determine how those most affected by this proposed name change felt. Six hundred and ten (610) survey post cards were sent to the 480 dwelling units, businesses and churches on Glenwood Avenue. Of the 211 responses (that's 35% response to a survey in which a 10% response is supposed to be good), 86% opposed the name change. Based on this overwhelming opposition the Committee on Names issued a report recommending against changing the name of Glenwood Ave. In addition, over 250 names were collected on petitions and sent to City Council opposing the name change. In addition, two of the residents called Clerk of City Council every Friday to find out if the renaming proposal would be on the agenda the following week. They, as well as NANA Coordinator, Charlene Morse, were assured that when the renaming of Glenwood Avenue was scheduled to be discussed by City Council or its Committees, these individuals would be informed.

Despite all assurances and despite the fact that this name change was also opposed by the Avondale Community Council, opposed by NANA – NANA President John Delaney was told by City officials last spring that it was "a dead issue" – and even opposed by the Zion Baptist Church where Rev. L. V. Booth had been pastor, the name change was brought up again on November 27th at Council's Committee on Neighborhood & Public Works, chaired by Paul Booth. A report from the City administration (dated August 1, 2001) which had recommended against changing the name of Glenwood Avenue was discussed. This report was forwarded to the November 28th City Council calendar without recommendation. On November 28 this report against changing the name of Glenwood to Rev. L. Venchael Booth was disapproved and filed. Subsequently, a motion to change the name of Glenwood was introduced, voted on and summarily approved without any notice to any of the Glenwood Avenue residents or opportunity for them to address City Council. Interestingly there were 6 proponents,

GREATER CINCINNATI COMMUNITY SHARES

Residents of North Avondale recently gathered in the home of **Bob and Kathy Laufman, 3953 Red Bud**, to learn about Greater Cincinnati Community Shares. This local federation of 21 nonprofit organizations was founded in 1996 to provide an opportunity for organizations which are not funded by United Way to conduct payroll giving campaigns with employees in workplaces.

According to Mary McCoy, Community Shares' executive director, "While United Way funds many worthy organizations, there are great groups they don't fund. Among these are organizations that provide services such as affordable housing, reproductive health care, alternative forms of education, environmental protection, and advocacy for equal rights." Community Shares conducted campaigns with employees of more than 50 workplaces this year, including the federal, state and city governments, the University of Cincinnati, the Cincinnati Public Schools, numerous nonprofit organizations (including all the Community Shares members), several businesses and several law firms. In its first five years, Community Shares raised \$700,000 for its member organizations.

Unlike United Way, Community Shares distributes donations based on donors' designations. "We encourage employees to give to the organizations of their choice," said Ms. McCoy. "It gives them more satisfaction in giving, and it fits our philosophy of people making choices to create changes in the community. It's a very democratic way to give."

Community Shares also receives funds from people outside the workplace who invest in the federation as a whole. These contributors support the growth of Community Shares and the services it provides its member organizations. These services include fund-raising, promotion, networking, training, and volunteering.

Bob and Kathy Laufman have been supporting Community Shares since 1997. Bob gives through his law firm. Said Kathy, "We invited our neighbors over to hear about Community Shares because the federation provides valuable options. It supports strong organizations, and it provides donors with an easy and effective way to give."

Can you name a warning sign for a stroke? If the answer is no, it's not good, considering that someone in America experiences a stroke every 53 seconds! The American Stroke Association (ASA) is a non-profit organization dedicated to researching ways to prevent and treat stroke. **Caroline Eady (944 Marion)** has just joined one of the new awareness programs sponsored by the ASA. As part of the Train to End Stroke team, Caroline will run a 26.2 mile marathon on June 23, 2002, in memory of Daniel Crowley, a friend who died from complications of a stroke. Aside from the physical training, this group will hold community events to raise awareness of stroke, and fundraise to reach the ASA goal of \$100,000. This breaks down to \$4700 per participant. Warning signs of stroke: 1) Sudden numbness or weakness of the face, arm, or leg, especially on one side 2) Sudden confusion, trouble speaking, or understanding 3) Sudden trouble seeing in one or both eyes 4) Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination 5) Sudden severe headache with no known cause.

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none of whom lived on Glenwood Avenue, to speak in support of the name change at the Committee and City Council meetings on the 27th and 28th. The residents feel that the way City Council voted to change Glenwood Avenue's name without providing Glenwood Avenue residents the opportunity to be heard is "an insult to the democratic process and is a disservice to City Council members." One opponent of the name change perceptively observed: **"In a sad, ironic and hypocritical twist, the renaming of Glenwood Ave. has been accomplished by the very political arrogance and institutional blindness that Rev. Booth, together with the late Dr. Martin Luther King, fought against during the height of their activist careers."**

In order to have an opportunity to be heard, residents of Glenwood Avenue are asking City Council to either reconsider the renaming of their street, or to issue a 90 day moratorium on implementation of the motion to rename. If neither of these is possible, they are asking that Council introduce a new motion renaming L. Venchael Booth Avenue back to Glenwood Avenue. Among the reasons residents oppose the name change are that the street has been named Glenwood since 1868. They consider Glenwood a beautiful and historic name and for the many long time residents the name has great sentimental value. There are also costs and great inconvenience to residents when a street name is changed. There are also logistical considerations regarding maps and official identification by public bodies when a street name is changed.

While opposing the renaming of their street, residents and others have suggested alternate ways to honor the Rev. L. V. Booth. These include an honorary corner such has been done for Rev. James Milton (at Reading Road/Lexington Ave.) and Cincinnati's Number One booster, Danny Ransohoff (at Reading Road/Morgan by the United Way/Community Chest Building). Another suggestion is to follow the example of Chicago which has replaced "renaming of streets" with "Honorary Streets" where the street name stays the same but under it there may be a sign that says Honorary with the person's name; i.e., L. Venchael Booth Avenue, added.

NANA is in support of these efforts of the Glenwood residents. NANA has been opposed to the renaming of streets to honor individuals because it is disruptive, antagonistic, costly and ultimately ineffective. If you are opposed to the renaming of Glenwood Avenue, or if you believe the residents of Glenwood Avenue should have an opportunity to be heard by City Council, NANA urges you to contact members of City

CHANGING RACISM: A PERSONAL APPROACH TO MULTICULTURALISM WORKSHOP
