# DO IT NOW!



Testimony by Charlene Morse at the College Hill Public Forum Monday, November 29, 2004

**CITY BUDGET HEARINGS** 

I am here to talk about cutting Recycling to an every other week pick-up - something that affects everyone in this city. We all know that:

- Recycling saves natural resources and conserves energy.
- Recycling diverts materials from the landfill, increasing its lifetime, and keeping disposal costs down.
- The City of Cincinnati is <u>proud</u> to have the **oldest** and **largest curbside recycling** program in the state.
- Cincinnati's curbside recycling contract is an integral part of the local recycling economy. Rumpke Recycling's presence in our community puts more than \$3.4 million in direct wages back into the community.
- It provides more than 100 Cincinnatians with jobs, ranging from recycling truck drivers, to marketing representatives and operations managers.

But did you know that:

• For every ton of recycled material, the City of Cincinnati gets **\$25** through a grant from Hamilton County. This money is used to subsidize the cost of recycling to the residents. The more you recycle, the more money the city gets back.

Last year this grant brought in approximately \$244,150 And did you know that:

- Historically when you go from weekly to biweekly pick-up the recycling goes **down 30%** and will start a spiraling downward trend toward less recycling.
  - Taking that figure into account with the cuts, the city stands to lose **\$73,245** this year.

And did you know that:

(1)

- The city is charged **\$24** a ton for trash taken to the **landfill.** 
  - Taking the 30% no longer being recycled and putting into the landfill would **cost** the city an extra **\$70,315**.
- So our "budget cut" of \$315,000 is already \$143.560 less equaling \$171,440. Add into that:
- The monetary effect on the 50/50 newspaper rebate the city shares with Rumpke.

Last year the city received \$520,000 from all grants & rebates.

• The added costs for transporting the additional nonrecycled refuse (the landfill is out of the city whereas the Rumpke single stream sorting plant is right off Vine Street in St. Bernard.)

This budget cut may end up costing us, not saving us money.

### Now is the time to encourage and promote recycling.

With the new single stream sorting technology (which you all need to go see):

- I now weekly recycle more than I send to the landfill.
- It is easier than ever to recycle (no separating).
- More materials than ever <u>can</u> be recycled.
- The potential is there to increase the materials recycled in the city which will bring into the city **more revenue**.
- Take a ton of potentially recyclable material. If recycled:
- The city **gets \$25** from the grant and a percentage of the 50/50 newspaper rebate

If <u>not recycled</u> it becomes trash to fill the landfill:

• The city pays \$24

Which means for every ton of recyclable materials we don't recycle it costs the city **\$49** (\$25 it doesn't get & the \$24 it has to pay)

This drives home the point that now is <u>not</u> the time to make cuts in recycling.

# The budget cut doesn't make:

- financial sense
- logical sense
- environmental sense
- and chips away at one of the few shining programs that places Cincinnati above other cities.

### **Testimony By Gerry Kraus**

On behalf of the North Avondale Neighborhood Association (NANA) and as a concerned citizen, I ask that the **NSP** (NEIGHBORHOOD SUPPORT **PROGRAM)** funding budgeted for 2005 be re-instated to a least \$10,000 per neighborhood ( $$5,000 \times 52$ neighborhoods = \$260,000) of the \$12,000 that was allocated to each of the 52 city neighborhoods in 2004. I do not see how you can **NOT** fund this worthy project that has successfully provided hundreds of thousands of volunteer hours to the benefit of the city during the 22+ years it has been in existence. How can NSP be adequately funded? Let me count the ways:

1. from the \$340,000 Neighborhood Business District (\$10,000 x 34 NBDs = \$340,000) proposed allocation for

2005. I don't understand why this newly funded (started in 2004) and unproven program should have precedence over the tried and true and very successful 22+ years the NSP program has been in existence; or

2. from the \$6,350,000 "Strike Force" Economic Development Fund in the **CITY MANAGER'S BUDGET** for 2005 which includes such item as a) \$1,700,000 for new hangar development; b) \$100,000 unspecified retail/commercial opportunities; c) \$650,000 downtown housing development; d) \$3,000,000 Fountain Square/Fountain Square garage; or

3. from the \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000/yr. that would come from **TAXING STOCK OPTIONS** as Councilmember Chris Smitherman has been advocating; or

4. from the approximately \$2,500,000+ that would come from **NOT ROLLING BACK the Real Estate Tax** from the 5 mills in 2004 to 4.98 mills proposed for 2005...or from the approximately \$6,000,000+ (and going up) per year if City Council adopted the 6.1 mill levy on Real Estate permitted by the City Charter; if gross annual property tax to the city is to be held constant as an Ordinance passed in October 2004 decrees, what is the economic point of encouraging development in the city! ...or

5. What ever happened to the **Anthem** monetary windfall? How much is left in this fund and why can't it be used to fund NSP or the City Manager's "Strike Fund" (#2 above).

If you fully utilize the Real Estate tax rate available to the City (#4 above), you will then in addition to NSP, be able to also appropriately fund **SNOW REMOVAL**, **RECYCLING**, as well as **TELEVISING CITY COUNCIL MEETINGS AND COMMITTEES**, and many other services that the public wants to see continued. ## Testimony by Marvin Kraus

I could not believe what I saw in the 2005-2006 operating budget booklet – that City Council had frozen the City's share of real estate taxes at \$29,000,000.00 in 2004! So the City doesn't benefit from any additions to the City's tax duplicate from new construction or improvements to our homes but all County Tax levies do such as the Hamilton County Park District, Mental Health and Drake Hospital.

I urge you to DEFROST the \$29,000,000 freeze, increase the City's share to the 6.1% allowed by the City Charter. That will produce about \$7,000,000 more annually. It will cost the owner of a \$200,000 home - \$120.00. A small price to pay for the restoration of weekly curbside recycling, snow removal on residential streets, NSP, a basic service back to \$12,000 and cable broadcast of Council and Council committee meetings into the homes of those who cannot in person see you in action.



# NEW ZONING FOR READING ROAD BUSINESS DISTRICT RECOMMENDED By Gerry Kraus

The City's Planning Department is recommending that the zoning of businesses along Reading Road in North Avondale be changed from CN-M (commercial-neighborhood mixed) to CN-P (commercial neighborhood-pedestrian) to restrict developments with drive-thru operations. The properties include most of the Gershuny lot on Reading Road between Avondale Avenue and Barry Lane, the Donald & Stewart Funeral Home, part of the former Antonio's Pizza Restaurant and the Fire Station just north of the Reading/Paddock Roads intersection. When the city's new zoning code was adopted in February 2004 City Council placed an IDC (Interim Development Control) overlay where there were Transitional (T) zones until the best zoning classification for these sensitive properties could be determined. Then in June at the request of NANA this IDC was expanded to include other vacant or potentially vulnerable properties along this business corridor.

The Gershuny property consists of 5 parcels. The parcel fronting on Avondale Avenue, adjacent to a single family home and formerly zoned single family transitional (R1-T) will remain zoned single family residential (SF-10). The Pizza property consists of 3 parcels. It has been recommended that the parcel fronting on Paddock Road, formerly zoned R1-T, and adjacent to a 2 family home be now zoned multi-family medium density residential (R-1.2). Also reviewed was the zoning of the Sickle Cell Awareness Office (3770 Reading Road), the Baptist Seminary (3800 Reading Road) and the Ohio National Guard Armory (4100 Reading Road). City staff recommends that these properties remain multi-family residential as they are presently zoned.

These recommendations will now be reviewed at a planning staff meeting on December 6. If approved at this meeting, the recommendations will then be sent to the City Planning Commission and to City Council for approval.
