Each year you and your neighbors donate around \$10,000 which is added to the Neighborhood Support (NSP) monies to help run the neighborhood. In 2005 the City cut our NSP budget from \$12,000 to \$7,000. Therefore, we asked the neighborhood to make up the difference. So far 447 (out of 2,820 households) have donated \$11,764.96. Up from previous years but short of our goal to cover the NSP budget cut. There are 287 people who usually pay dues who have not yet paid. We have one month left.

THE BELVEDERE'S 80TH ANNIVERSARY By Michelle Baxter

The Belvedere was conceived and built to epitomize the Queen City's unique identity, cultural sophistication and tradition of permanence. The Belvedere was the first luxury high rise apartment built in Cincinnati in 1925. It was built by Jacob Warm and Frank Messer. The Belvedere is a 12-floor building with 84 condominium units. The gaslight streets surrounding the building located at Rose Hill, Reading Road, and Clinton Springs Avenue were some of the most sought after addresses in town. In the 1920's apartment living was unheard of in Cincinnati, once one left the central downtown area. However the Belvedere's cosmopolitan reputation spread fast within the elite social circles of Cincinnati. It became so popular that even the most influential could not get in because of the waiting list. The building was molded after another luxury apartment building located on Park Avenue in New York City. The Belvedere's "New York Style" captivated and demanded the attention of all Cincinnatians. Many famous Cincinnati names have resided there over the past 80 years. Designed in Italian Renaissance, it is a landmark within our community. There are 12 small oval murals depicting pastoral scenes, with colorful and ornate patterns on an ivy background. The paintings are attributed to the late Herman Wessel, an established Cincinnati painter in the early -to- mid 20th Century. But because there are no clues, dates or signatures that indicate the artist's identity, after 80 years, the artist is still a mystery. The architectural history is highlighted by carved decorative limestone on the exterior, a wrought iron appointment both inside and out, a breathe taking oil painting on canvas in the lobby, ornate brass and wrought iron lamps at the front entrance, a U.S. Post Office mail chute (that still operates) and a beautiful roof top garden terrace, which provides a panoramic view of the city. Jazz Cann (Clinton Springs) wife of Allen B. Cann, a North Avondale resident since 1968, has been living an equestrienne lifestyle, ever since she was a little girl. She is employed by Elegant Carriage and has been driving carriages for many years around The Greater Cincinnati/Northern Kentucky area. Jazz takes pride and joy in dedicating long hours at the stable to care for her horse Zachary, which was rescued only a year ago from being malnourished. Zach is a magnificent and healthy 6 year old black Percheron horse that has considerable stamina and is an excellent trotter. In early October, Jazz took me on a ride of a life time throughout the city but more importantly through our neighborhood. The round trip carriage ride was a total of 12 miles. We started and finished the ride in Over-the-Rhine. Zachary pulled us up Liberty Hill, over Highland to University, Vernon to Harvey, Washington to Clinton Springs, Burton Woods, Leyman, RedBud, Rose Hill and Beechwood. Are you interested? Call Pauline at 751-8334 **City Winter Operations** In general, barring any extreme ice or weather conditions, citizens can expect:

- *On primary routes, at least one (1) lane will be open each way to allow traffic to flow within 24 hours after the end of an average storm (up to 3 ins. in 25 degree weather and up).
- *On residential routes, a single lane will be open to allow traffic to flow after the primary routes are cleared, or about 36 hours after the end of an average storm (up to 3 inches in 25 degree weather or warmer).
- *Extreme conditions may extend the treatment time to more than 48 hours (i.e. more than four shifts) after the end of the storm to provide a single lane open for traffic flow.
- *The City uses three treatment methods. Anti-icing is a pretreatment product (salt or salt brine) used on the streets to avoid snow or ice binding to roadways. De-icing occurs by using calcium chloride and salt on streets during the storm to melt snow or ice precipitation. Finally, ploving uses snow implements to remove higher accumulations of snow before using deicing products and is the slowest method.
