UPDATE ON THE RECENT EGGINGS:

Since the end of May, our neighborhood has experienced a high number of eggings. Most of these have been on cars, but houses have also been hit. After witnessing the culprits several times on our street (Red Bud Place), a few of us sat out one night last week watching for their car. They came, and we did stop their car for long enough to get their license plate number and the make and model of the car before they sped away. The license plate is: FAS8976, and it is a black Pontiac Grand Am, model year approximately 2000. Inside the car were 3 or 4 African American males, of high school age. The car and the individuals in it aligned with our earlier eyewitness descriptions of the vehicle and the culprits (at least on Red Bud Place). We are pretty sure that this was the same car.

The police tell us the license plate is registered to an address in Hyde Park, and as of this newsletter deadline we do not know if the police have found and spoken to the owner. Although we have moved in the right direction, <u>this issue is not yet resolved</u>. Several residents are interested in pressing charges, and we are gathering more information with the police, hoping to open that possibility. At this point, without eyewitness accounts and/or photos of them caught in the act, it is difficult for things to move forward. To that end, some of us are considering purchasing inexpensive (\$75), motion-activated cameras that will take still pictures during the night and posting one or two at central points in the neighborhood. Our real advantage over the culprits, though, is found in our ability to cooperate with each *(Continued on page 2)*

other as we take responsibility for our neighborhood. And we must do that. Nothing will substitute for the good people linking arms. These egg-tossing chickens don't know what they're up against.

Relevant details: To our knowledge, they have always come between 10pm and midnight; they often use brown eggs; they may have some kind of gun that shoots eggs from the car; they will come up driveways on foot if targets are too far away, leaving their car running in the street; they seem to have "favorite" targets, among them some of the higher priced cars in the neighborhood that have been hit regularly. To our knowledge, cars and houses have been hit on Rose Hill, Red Bud Avenue and Place, Avon Fields Lane and Place, Betula, Burton Woods and Beechwood. If you see "the car" or witness any of this kind of activity:

1.Call the police and report it.

- While it is occurring, call 911
- If you think there is evidence that merits having an officer come, call 765.1212
- If you just want it reported for insurance or to help the community by letting the police know, call 352.2960
- 2.Clean eggs off of cars quickly because they can seriously damage the paint. http://www.ehow.com/how_5709328_egg-off-car-paint.html Over here on Red Bud we've been doing car washes nearly every night at midnight. Have a car wash party
- 3.Write down everything you remember seeing, where you saw it, the time and date, etc. This is important because multiple incidents will blur together in your mind.
- 4.Out on walks, LOOK for littered egg cartons or other wreckage that might help us nail them with the grocery store cameras.
- 5.Whether or not you are interested in pressing any charges, please share your information about these incidents (past or future) with us so that we can continue to compile the list. Help us scramble the eggers.

The Adopt-A-Class program started at South Avondale School during the past school year. 16 classrooms are adopted. There are 11 more that need to be. We are excited for upper elementary teachers, Laura Slanker and Nancy Buchman, as they embark on a summer adventure of learning and travel. Laura and Nancy were selected to participate in a program that has been engaging educators in firsthand educational and scientific research at key conservation sites around the world since 2004. The program is based on Earth Expeditions from Dragonfly and the Cincinnati Zoo & Botanical Garden.

Like the course Laura completed last year at the Cincinnati Zoo on observing bonobo behavior, the courses she and Nancy are taking this summer also include classroom and field research projects that they can bring home to teach and share. TNSM students will be immersed, not just in factual information about their teachers' summer study, but will practice field research methods themselves as they tackle their own projects.

Laura will be studying at the UNESCO World Heritage site, Bahia de los Angeles on the Sea of Cortez. This reserve has been dubbed the "Galapogos Island" of Mexico for its biodiversity. Laura and her colleagues will apply the fundamentals of field methods - such as capture/recapture, pitfall traps and line transects - to ecological questions and conservation practice.

Nancy Buchman will be exploring the diverse terrestrial, coastal and coral reef communities of Belize. Nancy and her colleagues will join local scientists investigating conservation programs for species such as harpy eagles, jaguars, and manatees.

We look forward to Laura and Nancy's return as they share their experiences and engage the children in exciting projects this fall.

Did you know that 4 of 10 bites of food you eat were pollinated by bees? Did you know that bees have been experiencing population declines? Why should we care? As Einstein put it, "If the bee disappears from the surface of the earth, man would have no more than four years to live....No more bees, no more pollination, ...no more men!"

"But what can we do to help?" you might be thinking. Well, if you are interesting in bee-keeping I encourage you to look into it. There are many resources in the neighborhood and online for those interested in raising both honeybees and native bees. For those of us who aren't quite ready for that I suggest planting plants in your yard that are good nectar or pollen sources for bees. I came up with the list below as a starter (the list is not exhaustive!). This list includes plants that are good for bees and native to Ohio (except for Mahonia which is native to the northwest).

HOME VALUES GO DOWN

Many (though not all) home owners in North Avondale saw the value of their homes go down with the recent assessment. North Avondale is not alone in seeing a decrease in the value of their homes with the new assessment by the Hamilton County Auditor. This has been seen all over the tri-state.

It is a reflection of the housing market coupled with foreclosures and sales of distressed property selling at very low prices which have contributed to the decline in the property values

While reduction in value can result in overall decrease in taxes, special levies can effect the overall amount of taxes paid.

On the positive side - the median devaluation of America's top 50 cities is 30 percent. Cincinnati dropped 10.5 percent.

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The Cincinnati Park Board Urban Forestry Department will soon be addressing the issue of emerald ash borer (EAB) in North Avondale. Ash trees in the area have been found to be infested with EAB causing the decline and death of several trees. The Park Board has received a grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) to assist in the costs of removal and replacement of ash street trees. In North Avondale, the work will focus on streets where the streetscapes are comprised mostly of ash trees. Those streets include Winding Way, Lenox Pl, and Redway Ave. A majority of the ash trees on these streets may need to be removed. Those scheduled for removal will be marked with a vellow 'X' and homeowners will be notified via information left at their door. Replacement trees will be planted this fall.
