SPENCER R. CREW, OF THE NATIONAL UNDERGROUND RAILROAD FREEDOM CENTER TO SPEAK AT MARCH NANA MEETING

Spencer R. Crew, Ph.D., the Executive Director and Chief Executive Officer for the National Underground Railroad Freedom Center will speak at the March NANA General Meeting. Prior to this appointment, Dr. Crew was the Director of the Smithsonian Institution's National Museum of American History since 1992 and is a respected scholar of African American history. During Dr. Crew's tenure, numerous exhibitions opened, including "Piano 300," "Fast Attack and Boomer: Submarines in the Cold War," "Preserving the Star-Spangled Banner, The Flag That Inspired the National Anthem," "Within These Walls," and "The American Presidency: A Glorious Burden." Dr. Crew served as one of the curators on the "American Presidency" exhibition.

He was born in Poughkeepsie, New York, and raised in Cleveland, Ohio. He graduated from Brown University with a BA in History in 1971. He holds a master's degree (1973) and a doctorate (1979) from Rutgers University. After completing work at Rutgers he was an assistant professor of African American and American History at the University of Maryland Baltimore County. Dr. Crew has published extensively in the fields of African American history and public history.

The Freedom Center, a member of the Smithsonian Affiliations Program, is scheduled to open in 2004. Its purpose will be to recount the powerful American story of freedom from slavery and oppression using a variety of programs, exhibits, events, interactive and simulation media, and live performances. It will use the values of courage, cooperation, perseverance, and freedom that define the saga of the Underground Railroad to inspire visitors with a renewed commitment to strengthen and promote freedom everywhere. In his role as the Freedom Center's CEO, Crew will be in charge of the final design of programs and exhibits, and leading its day-to-day operations.

We have wonderful dogs living in North Avondale but everyone doesn't love your dog running on their property or public spaces and leaving behind their waste. Some people are afraid of dogs. Please be a good neighbor and always cleanup after

your dog and use a leash. We have the following City Ordinances for good reasons.

701-30. Dog Excrement Removal No person shall allow a **dog** under his or her control to be upon public property or upon the property of another, absent the consent of the owner or occupant of the property, without some device for the removal and containment of such dog's excrement; nor shall any person fail to remove any excrement deposited by any **dog** under his or her control on public or private property.

701-2. Leash Required

The owner or harborer of a harmless **dog**, not on the premises or in a motor vehicle, shall keep said **dog** on a leash of such length to keep the **dog** from annoying others. A harmless **dog** may be unleashed if either of the following is applicable:

- a. The dog is in training, a competition, or show or
- b. The **dog** is on property with the permission of the property owner.

ODOR COMPLAINT HOT LINE: 946-7777

Now that warmer months are upon us and people are outdoors more you may notice noxious odors in the air in the neighborhood. Be sure to call the Odor Hot Line if these odors bother you. Hamilton County Department of Environmental Services (DOES) has investigation specialists available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. When you are asked if you would like a specialist to come out to verify the odor, be sure to say, "YES". Under the City's Title X Air Nuisance Ordinance four (4) **verified** complaints about an odor are required for the city to take action. It helps (but is not necessary) to have in mind the following information before you call:

- Nature or description of odor
- When first noticed and is it still present
- Wind direction
- Intensity of odor, strong, mild or weak
- Health effects (headaches, burning eyes, nausea, etc.)
- Is odor very, somewhat, or not objectionable

Your neighbor, Mike Rieck (Ardmore Ave.), has been given a canister to capture odors and will do so if you call him at 961-6563. For further information call Mike or Gerry Kraus at 861-3939.

Every year the Cincinnati Park Board provides **free** trees for volunteer planting on private property & public rights-of-way along city streets. Return the form below by mail or fax or email (call the NANA office at 221-6166 for the emailed form). The trees will be about 6 to 8 ft. tall when you pick them up on **Saturday, April 6, from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m.**

The choices this year are: 'Magnolia' (grows 20-30 ft. tall, 20 ft. wide, large white & pink flowers, partial shade to full sun), 'Maple' (grows 30 to 40 ft. tall, Winged Samara fruit, light shade or full sun), 'Oak' (grows 50 to 80 ft. tall, acorn, leaves may persist through winter, full sun), 'Ash' (grows 50 to 80 ft. tall, 2" samaras on female trees, light shade or full sun), 'Baldcypress' (grows 50 to 70 ft. tall, looks like evergreen but drops leaves in winter, 1.5" cones, full sun intolerant of shade).
