GREAT AMERICAN CLEAN-UP NEEDS YOU By Gerry Kraus

For many years I have coordinated Keep Cincinnati Beautiful's (KCB) spring neighborhood clean-up. This annual event is important to give a jump-start for cleaning up the litter that has accumulated all winter on city streets and in public parks. Traditionally held the last Saturday in April - this year on April 26 - the Clean Up in North Avondale heralds the beginning of NANA's spring/summer beautification activities. Since I have decided to retire as coordinator of this activity, NANA is seeking a new volunteer coordinator for this Great American Clean-Up event. I cannot stress enough the importance of this activity to set the tone for minimizing litter accumulation on our streets and public places throughout the rest of the year. Basically the job involves a couple of hours prep time before Clean-Up Day to determine which streets and public places should be cleaned, to collect equipment, etc. and on Clean-Up Day to be at Seasongood Square Park from 9:30 AM to 12 Noon to give out assignments and equipment to the many volunteers (usually about 50) who come. Optional is having The Great American Grill Out at noon which involves calling Spencer Konicov who has in past years been chef and done 90% of the work associated with the Grill Out. If you care about the appearance of North Avondale, and if you would like to do something to maintain the livability of North Avondale without taking on a long term commitment then volunteering to coordinate this year's Great American Clean Up is for you. THE FUTURE OF RECYCLING IN CINCINNATI

While the City's Curbside Recycling Program survived the budget cuts of 2003, it is slated to be eliminated in 2004 unless money can be found to continue this program. One way to encourage City Council to find the necessary funding is to demonstrate the popularity of recycling by recycling. Last year over 11,000 tons of material were recycled. This was not only environmentally responsible (saving much landfill space) but it was economically efficient. At \$22.00 per ton tipping fee at the Rumpke landfill, the city saved over \$242,000 plus the cost of transporting these 11,000 tons to Colerain Township.

EVERYONE CAN RECYCLE

If you live in a one family to four family dwelling, you can participate in the city's curbside recycling program. If you live in a larger apartment building, you can bring your recyclable material to the drop-off bin located in the rear part of the North Avondale Community Center parking lot, 617 Clinton Springs which is open 7 days a week, 24 hours a day. Items accepted at N. Avondale Center include: #1 and #2 plastic bottles, glass jars and bottles, aluminum and bi-metal beverage cans, steel and tin food cans, empty steel aerosol cans with tips removed, phone books, newspapers, magazines and brown grocery bags – same as curbside. If you need a green recycling bin, call the Rumpke Recycling at 242-4600.

Beyond the above recycling opportunities NANA operates a quarterly recycling center to collect mixed paper. Mixed paper is cardboard, cereal boxes, beverage cases, corrugated cardboard office paper or newspapers. If you can tear it, we take it! Not accepted are pizza boxes because of the remaining food and grease. The next quarterly mixed paper recycling will take place on Saturday, March 8, from 10:00 AM to 2 PM behind the North Avondale School.

Special pick ups of furniture, appliances, dead animals can be arranged by calling the **Public Service Customer Hotline at 591-6000**. You may even recycle up to 4 tires without rims by placing them curbside on trash day AND also calling 591-6000 beforehand to inform Sanitation of the location of the tires. Many other items like Ink Jet & Laser Cartridges, Household Hazardous Materials, etc. can be recycled. Call Keep Cincinnati Beautiful at 352-4385 or go to www.keepcincinnatibeautigul.com to find out where.

The Solid Waste Management District has planned four Household Hazardous Material (HHM) Collection Events this year. These free events are scheduled from 9:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the following dates and locations:

April 26 - Bayer Corporation in Addyston

May 3 - Ethicon Endo-Surgery in Blue Ash

October 18 - Winton Woods High School in Forest Park

October 25 - Coney Island in Anderson Township

Collected will be automotive fluids, pesticides or fertilizers, solvents & thinners, lawn & pool chemicals, batteries & cleaners. RECREATION FACILITIES FUNDING TO START NOW By Gerry Kraus

On February 26 City Council passed an ordinance that allocates to the Cincinnati Recreation Commission \$6,500,000 in 2003 for capital improvement projects. This ordinance was in response to a motion by Council Member David Crowley to restore to the Cincinnati Recreation Commission (CRC) capital improvement funding so that long-awaited repairs and renovations to CRC facilities (community centers, ball fields, tennis courts, riverfront, infra-structure) could begin in 2003. A 11/2 year CRC study had identified a backlog of needed repairs, maintenance and renovations to CRC facilities that would cost \$109 million. In response to this need \$13.8 million had been allocated in the 2003-2004 City Budget for this purpose. The money was to come from the \$55 million Anthem Fund the city had received. After the December public hearings on the budget City Council changed the source of CRC capital improvement money from Anthem to other funding sources, most of which would not be available until 2004 and \$6 million of which to come from anticipated managed competition savings which might not be realized. In order for CRC to begin its repair and renovation program this spring, Council Member Crowley asked that \$6.5 be borrowed from the Anthem money and to be paid back in 2004 when a \$7 million bond issue, originally designated for the Over-The-Rhine Community Center and which is no longer to be used for this purpose, becomes available. The NANA Executive Committee had unanimously voted to support Mr. Crowley's motion on February 4. This action was ratified by the community at NANA's February 11 monthly meeting.

- Louise Harmon Stallworth, (Dickson) was one of five who received the Urban League of Greater Cincinnati's Glorifying the Lions Award which recognizes senior citizens who have made outstanding contributions to Cincinnati.
- The late Fredrick Suggs, (formerly Reading Road) was given a special dedication during the Dr. Martin Luther King 40th Anniversary March. Mr. Suggs led the march for almost 39 years before passing away earlier this year.


