XAVIER/VICTORY PARKWAY PROJECT UPDATE

Attending the Park Commissioners' April 20 Board meeting were Victory Parkway residents Jim Faulkner and Glenna Kennedy and NANA Coordinator Charlene Morse. Charlene presented the NANA Motion from the General Meeting on April 11 which states "That there be no Nature trail and no steps over the sewer" (28-3-0). Even though XU last told NANA that they did not plan on building a nature trail at this time, NANA felt "at this time" was too open ended and prompted the need for the above motion. She further explained that the neighborhood objected to the steps because it would encourage individuals to explore the area and that it would impair NANA's "keep it natural" position. Jim & Glenna each explained again why they opposed development of a proposed nature trail at the Xavier University development along Victory Parkway and the steps. Jim also stressed the need for the sewer system to be fixed (the proposed steps are to go over a damaged sewer).

Mr. Ach moved "to approve the recommendations of staff to eliminate the nature trail" It was seconded and all commissioners were in favor.



I was not going to get on my soap box this year but the appearance of a new dreaded flag on the lawn of one of the last resisting neighbors made me change my mind. In fact I was looking out the window, noticing how thick and green our lawn was without the help of any poison, when I notice the little sign forbidding pets and children from what should be their natural playing field. REVERSE THE BLIGHT By Pauline Daly

Update on issue of mobile businesses:

Charlene Morse, Tom Jones, Officer Cruse, and Pauline Daly met with the owner of the Mini-Minute Market on Wheels. It was agreed that there is a perception, perhaps a stereotype, that these businesses are connected with illegal activity. The owner is motivated by profit and an arrest and conviction would end her business. All present felt that mutual cooperation would be most beneficial.

The concerns the neighborhood presented were: 1. The safety of children; 2. Damage to grass and trees in the park; 3. Trash; 4. Attraction for loitering and crime.

We suggested she park the van across the street from the park. This makes it less likely children will cross the street to go to the van. Also, there should be less damage to the park from the customers. The owner is paying a neighborhood resident to pick up trash daily. The owner and the neighborhood need to work together to make loitering and illegal activities less comfortable in the vicinity of the truck. Illegal activity needs to be reported to the police.

Together we considered regulations for mobile businesses that we will discuss with the city. These were: 1. Hours of business (Should a business serving children be out after dark?); 2. Should there be a limit on the amount of time a vehicle is stopped at one location?; 3. Should there be a requirement the truck locate where the visibility is not restricted?; 4. Should the mobile business be responsible for the trash it generates?; 5. When located to attract students as they leave school, how close to the school can the truck be? What if its location results in children having to cross the street without a crossing guard?

We have had contact with Madisonville and Winton Terrace to work on these concerns. We would welcome other communities who wish to be involved. If you have additional ideas or suggestions, call NANA at 221-6166.

Fluorescent Lamp Recycling Fluorescent lamps can be recycled to reclaim 100% of the glass, aluminum and other metals. They recycle the aluminum end caps, glass, the phosphor, & the mercury. The city of Cincinnati does not accept spent fluorescent lamps in its "green bin" curbside recycling program. Cincinnati households wishing to recycle fluorescent lamps can take them to: USA Lamp & Ballast Recycling, 5366 Este Ave. (Winton Hills/Winton Place). Call 651-4155 to verify hours of operation and to get advice on the proper way to safely transport a small number of fluorescent lamps.
