727 UPDATE

The renovation of 727 S. Fred Shuttlesworth Circle is an example of a vital community project offering a high return on investment to all involved. I applaud North Avondale's efforts and am proud to offer the city's support of their endeavors.

Two years, 2,000 volunteer hours and \$225,000 (in dollars and contributions) later, we're finally there...the finale of the renovation of 727 S. Fred Shuttlesworth Circle. Mark your calendar for a Neighborhood Open House with an unbelievable "Before" Gallery of Photographs courtesy of Norton Photography: **Saturday, May 12 from 10:00 AM - 4:00 PM.**

The NANA Board has determined the details for the listing of the house. The listing price will be \$189,900, and there will be three NANA-required caveats:

The house must be owner-occupied.

The house must remain single-family.

Though the house is located in an R-3T zone, its use (particularly related to home business) must conform to the standards of an R-1 property.

The sale of the house will be managed by **Erik Zimmerman & Geoffrey Barnes** of Comey & Shepherd, 321-4343. NANA will begin accepting contracts/offers Friday, May 11th.

And of course, where there's a finale, there's a final cleanup. So it's all hands on deck for one last blast of NANA's volunteer SWAT team on **Sunday, May 6 from 11:00 - 3:00.** Sweeping, dusting, vacuuming, spritzing windows and polishing sink bowls, tip to stern, top to bottom. Please call me at 281-6644 to let us know you're coming (it's rumored pizza and pop will be served).

North Avondale has to be the most on-the-move, fix-it-up community in all of Cincinnati. Since I've begun sharing stories about the great contractors we've found through our project at 727, I've been inundated with requests for roofers, painters, tilers, electricians, plumbers, carpenters and repairmen. I'm considering charging a commission! Here's the deal... I will prepare a listing of all the contractors who worked on the renovation of 727 S. Fred Shuttlesworth, what they did and how to get in touch with them. The listing will be available at the Neighborhood Open House Tour on May 12th and through the NANA office after that.

And of course, in closing, I must share a couple more kudos for our latest partners:

David Mukasa and his team at KM Network, Inc. have performed miracles in reworking every window in the house... ropes, pulleys, weights, frames, panes, the works. David has helped us keep the integrity of the original double-hung, wood-frame windows while restoring function and insulation. **Andrea Stewart** from Interior Design Concepts and her partners from Finishing Touches Hardwood Floors have created sheer brilliance on every throughout. The hardwood floors of the entry, living room and dining room have been taken back a hundred years. Who would have thought such nice wood was

ICE CREAM TRUCKS

The Police must have a complaining witness willing to testify in court in order to prosecute city ordinance 910-7. When you are bothered by loud noise coming from ice cream trucks and are willing to testify, call the police at 765-1212 IMMEDIATELY. Write down the truck license plate number and time of day. It helps to also have another witness.

910-7 Loud Noises: No person, firm or corporation shall operate or cause to be operated any whistle, rattle bell, gong, clapper, hammer, drum, horn, radio, phonograph or other sound-producing or sound-amplifying instrument so as to emit loud and raucous noises or in any other way create noise or sound, or permit the creation of noise or sound in such manner as to disturb the peace and quiet of a neighborhood or as to interfere with the transaction of business or other ordinary pursuits.

If you drive or walk down the main streets of North Avondale, you will notice that they are unusually litter free. We can thank the 64 volunteers (listed below) who took 1 to 2 hours out of their busy lives to participate in North Avondale's commitment to the Great American Clean Up on Saturday, April 21. In addition to the main streets (Reading Road, Clinton Springs, Mitchell, Dana, Washington, Paddock), the volunteers cleaned up Seasongood Square and Martin Luther King Jr. parks, the areas around the Burton School and the North Avondale School/Recreation complex.

At noon the anti-litter brigades were rewarded with NANA's Great American Grill Out organized by chef Spencer Konicov. John Schlagetter donated a delicious salad and Gerry Kraus provided her famous Boston baked beans. Judging from the amount of food and drinks consumed and the people lingering on until 1:30 p.m. it appeared a good time and a neighborly time was had by all. The drinks, as well as clean up supplies, were supplied by Keep Cincinnati Beautiful. The North Avondale/Paddock Hills Business Association (NAPHBA) donated \$50.00 toward expenses. And NANA provided whatever else was needed. Special kudos go to NANA Coordinator Charlene Morse and her son Ryan who drove around the neighborhood providing additional supplies to volunteers, collecting filled trash bags, bagging the "Gershuny" mattress that had been hidden in the rear of his property and generally providing the glue that made this clean up such a success.

REVERSE THE BLIGHT

At the April NANA General Meeting Robert Harris from the National Council of Community Injustice spoke about the community dialogue that they can facilitate, as described in the April NANA News.

Twelve people have signed up for it. Anyone interested is welcome. There can be more than one group. In North Avondale we often feel we have made more progress in racial understanding than many other neighborhoods because of the diversity of our residents. That is true but we have a long way to go. Understanding does not happen simply because there are equal numbers of white and black neighborhood residents, committee members, and equal balance in our public face. It requires listening to each other and sharing thoughts and feelings.

We live in social and economic segregation and view the rest of the neighborhood with suspicion. People who benefit from the system as it is do not rock the boat. They don't recognize that they benefit because of injustice to someone else. White parents do not experience the fear that black parents do that their sons will be harmed because of their race. People who have experienced discrimination often have quit talking because they feel they are not being listening to.

Considering we have these problems in North Avondale, how much more progress needs to be made in neighborhoods that are not as diverse.

To get a background on Cincinnati, race issues, and poverty read these books:


- "Race and the City" edited by Henry Louis Taylor, Jr.
