UPDATES ETC. By Gerry Kraus Environmental & City Hall Liaison

FAIR SHARE FOR PARKS UPDATE: The Fair Share for Parks Committee has been trying to get the Hamilton County Park Board to share the \$18 million annual income that it will receive if a levy to replace the current county parks levy, Issue 4 on the May 7 Primary ballot, passes. Not one penny of the current park levy (which presently yields \$12 million per year) goes to city parks. City parks are funded by the City of Cincinnati general fund. NANA voted to support the mission of this Committee at its March meeting. Since the Hamilton County Park Board has been unwilling to share any of the revenues to be raised by this tax levy, the Fair Share for Parks Committee formed another Committee called: NO SHARE - NOT FAIR - VOTE NO ON HAMILTON COUNTY PARK LEVY (ISSUE 4) **COMMITTEE.** The Committee is asking voters who believe some small portion of the Hamilton County Parks levy should help support city parks to vote "NO" on Issue 4 to send this message to the Hamilton County Park officials. Even if this replacement levy fails, the County Parks will continue to receive its \$12 million as the current levy does not end until the end of 2003.

NEW ZONING CODE UPDATE: On April 24 NANA representatives Marvin & Gerry Kraus attended a meeting to give input into the draft new zoning code proposals. Marvin stressed the importance of maintaining the current mandatory requirements in the present code for residential zoning. He also stressed the importance for maintaining current zoning requirements for group homes as well as the need for meaningful enforcement of the zoning code. Gerry pointed out that the proposed zoning code did not address issues of Environmental Justice. Neighborhoods that are/or could be impacted with land uses that disparately and adversely affect that neighborhood should be protected. She offered some suggested language to address this important issue. NANA will follow closely the final recommendations for the new zoning code and how this code will affect North Avondale.

MONITORING THE OZONE COUNT IN NORTH AVONDALE: Environmental Defense and ECO: (Environmental Community Organization) are looking for volunteers to help conduct an exciting ozone (smog) monitoring project in Cincinnati neighborhoods. These neighborhoods will be chosen, if there are sufficient volunteers, for measurements to be

SWIMMING YEAR-ROUND AT THE NEW HIRSCH POOL By Pauline Daly

Funding has been approved by the Otto Armleder Foundation for an aquatic size swimming pool (zero inches to four feet rounded pool) at Hirsch Center. The money may not be available for a few years, however, according to the legal conditions.

The question has been asked, "What would it cost for it to be an standard size indoor pool?" The answer is, \$3,300,000 in addition to the \$1,200,000 that has already been promised

Now is the time to consider whether to there is a need to pursue an regular indoor pool. It would not make sense unless there is enough interest in using it to make it worthwhile. Both North Avondale and Avondale residents, as well as other people who use Cincinnati Recreation Services and find the location convenient would use it.

What do you think? Would you use it? What are your reasons? It will take the demonstration of real need, commitment, and cooperation from the neighborhoods for funding to be considered. Call or preferably write the neighborhood councils.

taken every weekday afternoon during the summer (June thru August) of the smog levels around them to determine if certain neighborhoods have a higher smog/ozone level than the average reported for Greater Cincinnati. Newly developed state-of-the-art monitoring technology will be used. Smog and bad air quality can exacerbate asthma and other respiratory diseases. The American Lung Association reports that over 17.7 million people (including over 5.6 million children) have asthma, and the disease is the leading cause of childhood hospitalization. Participation in this ozone-monitoring project will determine if extra measures need to be taken to minimize adverse affects of bad air in our neighborhood.

NANA seeks 5 volunteers (one for each weekday) to participate in this project. The time commitment is two five minute time periods, one hour apart, on weekday afternoons, at a time period to be determined – either between 2 and 3 PM or 3 and 4 PM. If we have at least 5 volunteers, we can exchange days when one volunteer goes on vacation. Volunteers will be trained.
