A Design Team is forming for Building the new Burton School. We welcome neighborhood residents, and people with knowledge of science and building design.

With the decline in CPS enrollment we need to justify that Burton should be built. Without the new building, Burton (North Avondale's Neighborhood School) will be closed and the students will attend other CPS schools. Judging by enrollment numbers, they would attend South Avondale and Rockdale schools filling them to capacity and leaving no room for charter school students who return or additional students who might move into the neighborhood. Since North Avondale is a Magnet School and usually has a waiting list, it would not be an option.

THE MECCA OF EXCHANGE STUDENTS

A profound idea was born of war. A. Piatt Andrew and Stephen Galatti founded the American Field Service (AFS) after WWII. Today AFS celebrates 60 years of history to the worlds most experienced inter-cultural exchange organization. They offer programs (hosting and sending abroad) in over 50 countries and have over 300,000 active volunteers. With AFS and other exchange programs, once again another hidden gem is discovered in our community.

In the past decade many extraordinary neighbors have opened their hearts and homes to help teenagers from all over the world discover our American heritage. North Avondale has been the "Mecca" of welcoming and hosting a large number of foreign exchange students in Cincinnati year after year. Our neighborhood's outstanding host families, active volunteers, friends have accepted these students into the fabric of our community. Georgia and Jim Moore (Rose Hill Avenue) and Linda and Michael Hill (Burton Woods Lane) have dedicated much volunteer time into successfully placing and mentoring over 39 students from 20 different countries in our area. In this diverse community, about 27 neighborhood host families have welcomed foreign teenagers into their lives. Most importantly they have helped to educate, motivate, take care of and treat them as part of the family.

Our small neighborhood has a big heart! Currently 7 exchange students representing, 7 different countries live in North Avondale. These students represent three different organizations A.F.S, Y.F.U. (Youth for Understanding) and E.F. (Educational Foundation) Linda and Doug Sawan, (Burton Woods Ln.) are hosting Deborah Marchetti, an AFS student from Brazil. Molly and Lee Parrott/Katz, (Rose Hill Avenue) are hosting with AFS for the fifth time, this year Ryuki Hamada from Japan. Michelle and Darren Baxter, (Clinton Springs Avenue) are hosting Davide Cacciatori, an AFS student from Italy. Hope and Fred Felton/Miller, (Betula Avenue) are hosting Marie Olesen, a YFU student from Denmark. Jim Obergefell, Jim Arthur, Curtis Arthur and Sophia Vidas, (Betula Avenue) are hosting not just one but TWO E.F. students. Carol Seffers is from Sweden, and Jussi Salminen is from Finland. Marla and Tony Barone, (Red Way Avenue) are hosting Johannes Nobel, an EF student from Germany. All of these students have lived in our neighborhood for the past year. They arrived in early August and will leave in late June of this year.

Possibly so many students come to our neighborhood because of what North Avondale already does so well: celebrate diversity. Overall the families that have opened their hearts and home to these amazing teenagers have enriched their lives by their openness to different cultures. Most host families have experienced deep bonds and have built strong relationships with the students. I know first hand the many rewards of hosting an exchange student. Darren and I jumped right into this adventure by becoming first time AFS host parents. It truly has been an amazing learning experience, an exchange of ideas and an equal give-and-take for us. We have been blessed with an abundance of love, joy and happiness by having Davide become an extension of our family. In my

opinion, success, was just saying *yes* to the vision, commitment and intention to make a positive difference in a teenager's life. Parents and students at this point in the year are realizing their journey is almost over. Many parents, host-parents, teachers, children, friends and neighbors will fondly remember the moments, which defined these student's maturity and independence. We trust that North Avondale families will continue to give exchange students an educational opportunity and the American experience of a life time.

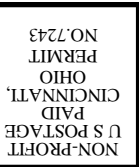
