PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Thank you to all the North Avondale residents who attended the meeting. It was a long night but also an informative one.

I wish more North Avondale residents had attended the meeting. I sent out a SOS for attendance at the meeting in the September NANA Newsletter. The next mayor and members of city council were at the meeting and attendance by residents could have been better. North Avondale missed an opportunity to show the people who will be in charge of the City that NANA has the strong support and involvement of the neighborhood residents.

North Avondale is Cincinnati's best address. But lets face it, with enough neglect, it could lose that distinction. NANA is partly responsible for making North Avondale such a great place to live. As president, I've seen that NANA successfully fights against the forces that work to erode the quality of life in this neighborhood.

Installing a "Welcome to Avondale" sign in the center of North Avondale is disrespectful (I can't promise that some loyal NORTH Avondale neighbor won't remove

it!). It is unkind and ignores all NANA's hard work. Whomever had the sign installed please take it down. North Avondale has always been friendly and courteous to Avondale and we deserve the same treatment in return.

HELP WANTED

Two of the 8 flower beds at the Victory Parkway/ Dana Avenue Triangle are about to be plowed under and returned to grass...unless NANA can find two volunteers (one for each bed) who are willing to "adopt a plot". This site is one of the prominent entry points to North Avondale and gives a special welcome to our neighborhood. It would be a sad statement to have the floral beauty of this entry diminished.

What does adopting a plot entail? A volunteer would be expected to prepare his/her bed for spring planting by removing dead flowers and weeds from last year and be part of the team to plant new flowers (provided by NANA) in May. Then for about 2 hours per month (time at your convenience) during the growing season (May - September) you should weed your bed. Since an automatic water sprinkling system has been installed for all the flower beds at this site, there would no obligation to water your bed.

Perhaps you can join with a friend or neighbor and team up to reduce the volunteer time even more. Help keep North Avondale the City's Best Address by helping to maintain one of its scenic flowering entry ways. PRESERVATION EASEMENTS PROTECT HISTORIC PROPERTIES

If you have a historic home that you'd like to protect forever and get a nice federal income tax deduction for doing so, consider donating a preservation easement to the Cincinnati Preservation Association.

Over the last 37 years, CPA has preserved historic buildings through a variety of methods--acquisition and restoration, relocation, a revolving fund, and preservation easements. CPA currently holds preservation easements or covenants on 70 historic properties.

What is a Preservation Easement?

A Preservation Easement is a legal agreement between a grantor and a grantee that conveys to the grantee the right in perpetuity to preserve the architectural and historical features of a building or property. This agreement runs with the land and is binding in perpetuity.

Essentially an easement is a donation of an interest in a property or a portion of an owner's property rights. In the easement agreement, an owner commits to preserving the property in its historic appearance, getting written permission from CPA to make alterations and refraining from demolition.

Eligible Properties

To be eligible for a preservation easement, a property must be listed in National Register of Historic Places, either individually or as part of a historic district. North Avondale has already been partially evaluated for its historic and architectural significance through the Ohio Historic Inventory, which was completed by CPA in 1978. Numerous properties and several potential districts in North Avondale could be listed in the National Register if the owners are interested.

Tax benefits

The donation of a preservation easement is considered a charitable contribution for federal income tax purposes. The value of an easement on a home ranges from 10 to 14% of the market value of the property. If you have a vacant buildable lot, the value of the easement on an open space is 36% of the market value.
