PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

I just returned from a trip to Prague, Czech Republic, and as usual when I visit European cities, I was again struck by how neat and clean the city is overall. Why, I wonder, do European cities seem significantly cleaner and more cared for than American cities? I don't have an answer, however, I guess it's because they take pride in their homes and cities, and Americans somehow lack that same sense of pride.

It seemed I couldn't walk more than 20 steps without passing a building that was being repaired, renovated, painted or otherwise improved upon. Yes, I did see buildings that still need a great deal of work; however, Prague is a bit unusual in that it's only been a democracy since 1989, following 40 years of Communist rule. The Czech people are still adapting to capitalism, so it's realistic that not everyone has been able to afford the necessary repairs or improvements. However, that doesn't prevent them from doing what they can to show pride in their homes by planting flowers, etc.

Why can't I say the same about Cincinnati? Unfortunately, I pass too many homes and buildings that are in serious disrepair. We have beautiful historic homes that are falling apart, many of which are reaching the point of no return. When we lose buildings with history and charm, we lose part of what makes Cincinnati the city I fell in love with when I moved here in 1984.

Many homes in North Avondale are obviously cared for by owners and residents, and I often comment on the micro-economy in home renovations and repair that our neighborhood supports. Many of our neighbors do have pride in their homes and it shows. However, there are also far too many properties where it's clear no one cares. If you live in one of these properties, take the time and effort to clean, paint, plant flowers, pick up litter or anything else you can do to improve your property. If you need help, ask your friends, family and neighbors. If you live in a rental property, demand that the owners improve the condition of the property; as a tenant, you have the right to expect a certain level of repair.

Show some pride in your home and you help improve our neighborhood and city. Perhaps one day, Europeans who travel to Cincinnati will leave thinking we care about our homes and city as much as they do.

On an unrelated note, I'd like to thank everyone who's sent in 2002 NANA membership dues! So far, we've received 428 donations, 16% of all North Avondale households. If you haven't sent in donations, it isn't too late - you can make your 2002 membership donation through December 31, 2002. NANA succeeds because of the commitment of our residents, and we appreciate any support you're able to provide.



Your neighbors in North Avondale are getting together

Block Parties are a great way to connect. The Rose Hill/Beechwood area had their party last month. The east side of North Avondale had theirs in June. These block parties are in someone's home (Nizny & Brush/Knue respectively). Everyone brings a covered dish while the host or a group of hosts provide the meat and beverages. The Burton Woods/Red Bud/Leyman group closes off part of Burton Woods, sets up tables and everyone brings a covered dish plus in a few dollars to cover the meat, etc.

Block Watch is another way to get to know your neighbors (see article on page 3)

Passeggiata is Italian meaning to walk; promenade; to take a walk; to stroll. Neighbors meet at a predetermined date & time and walk around their streets for about an hour. Some neighbors put out food or drink that the strollers sample as they walk and talk. Two areas, the Beechwood/Rose Hill & Burton Woods/Red Bud/Leyman areas are doing this monthly. It is rumored that Deborah Ginocchio and Vanessa Wayne started this new North Avondale tradition about a year ago. The Burton Woods started theirs in August.

CITY HALL UP-DATES

Advertising Benches Unsightly: In keeping with City Council's goal to address quality of life issues in neighborhoods and to make them more livable, Councilmember Chris Monzel initiated a public hearing on advertising benches, which took place at Council's Neighborhood & Public Works Committee on October 15. Representatives from nine neighborhoods (from Price Hill to Mt. Washington), as well as Keep Cincinnati Beautiful Director Linda Holterhoff, spoke about how advertising benches adversely affect their neighborhoods. Among the complaints were that they impede pedestrian and wheel chair traffic; that they accumulate litter; that they sometimes block neighborhood beautification projects like flower beds; and that they are unsightly and should not be allowed to be placed in the public right-of-way. The city laws that regulate the placement, number, and the maintenance of advertising benches are enforced only on a complaint basis. Most frequent complaints, according to city administration, are about sidewalk blockage or the number of benches at a single site. Councilmember Minette Cooper offered that bus riders need benches to sit on while waiting. Some speakers suggested that where they may be needed, neighborhood groups should be permitted to provide more visually attractive benches and place them in a safe manner so as not to obstruct sidewalks. One person suggested that private individuals or companies could pay for such benches with a small plaque recognizing the donor. Councilmember Monzel asked the administration to draft a new policy on use of the public right-of-way for advertising benches as well as other private uses (newspaper racks, telephones, Metro bus shelters). 

NSP 2003 FUNDING

NANA is in the process of deciding how to spend \$10,000 NSP (Neighborhood Support Program) funds in 2003. The City of Cincinnati has for the past 20 years allocated \$10,000 per year to each of its 52 neighborhood groups for projects and activities that enhance the quality of life in each neighborhood. In past years NANA has spent their \$10,000 on: publishing the NANA NEWS, membership development, beautification - including our 22 adopted flower beds, & a paid coordinator to follow up on issues of safety, code enforcement, land development and zoning.

At this time, as in the past, the categories are: Newsletter, Clean-up & Beautification, Land Development & Improvement, Environmental Affairs, Law Enforcement & Safety, Membership and Seniors & Youth Projects. The Executive Committee will propose the dollar amounts for each category to present to the general body. We will discuss and vote on the final 2003 NSP proposal at the NANA November General Meeting (11/12).

Each year NANA would like to use some of its NSP money for new projects or activities. If you have an idea for improving North Avondale that you would like included in the 2003 NSP request, call the **NANA Office at 221-6166**.

APPLICATIONS BEING ACCEPTED


