NORTH AVONDALE TEEN TO BE IN WORLD COMPETITION By Christine K. Emerson

Marcus Taylor (15), a member of the Cincinnati Ropin' Rockets demonstration team coached by Chris Emerson (physical education teacher and coach of the Rockets at North Avondale Montessori Elementary) has had a busy summer. He won four gold medals at the regionals in Indianapolis, which enabled him to advance to the Nationals. There he became the Grand National Champion after winning two trophies at the National Jump Rope Competition June 21-25 at Disney World. Marcus won a trophy in the Triple Unders (the rope must go under your feet 3 times for each jump) breaking the National record with 102 Triple Unders in one minute. His second trophy was for the Single Rope One-minute Speed Competition, in which he jumped 333 times in one minute, also breaking the National record. In the 15-17 year-old age group, he also won golds in his Freestyle routine and Single Rope One-Minute Speed and a silver medal in Three-Minute Speed.

He went on to compete July 7th in the Grand Master Pan American Jump Rope Championships in Greeley, Colorado and won the Gold Medal for the most points earned for four events; 30 Second Single Rope Speed, 3 Minute Single Rope Speed, Triple Unders (as many as you can do, no time limit) and his 45-75 second Single Rope Freestyle Routine. Marcus broke the World Record in 3 Minute Single Rope Speed with 872 jumps and broke the National Record in Triple Unders with 170 Triple Unders.

Marcus is now qualified to be one of the top 5 male jumpers to be a part of the United States Jump Rope Team to represent the United States in the World Rope Skipping Tournament in Seoul, Korea in October, 2001. If he does well there he could be picked to be on the international rope-jumping team.

Marcus is an enthusiastic, persistent and hard working young man. He started jumping in first grade at North Avondale Montessori but didn't become a serious jumper and join the team until fourth grade. He lives in North Avondale with a single mom. The trip to Korea will cost about \$4000.00 in order for him to be able to participate in this wonderful experience of a life time event.

Sponsorships are needed for this talented young athlete to attend the World Competition in South Korea. The Ropin' Rockets have raised money by jumping at schools and many other events throughout the Cincinnati area. LITTER LAW: Ordinance 714-3 Litter in Public Places No person shall throw or deposit litter in or upon any street, sidewalk or other public place within the city except in public receptacles or in authorized receptacles for collection.

Penalty, Sec. 714-99A A violation of any provision of this chapter is a minor misdemeanor if it is a first offense.

QUO VADIS: The Armory? By Gerry Kraus

How do you want the Ohio National Guard Armory property at 4100 Reading Road redeveloped: housing, if so what kind? business, if so what kind of enterprises? As was reported in the last *NANA News*, the Ohio National Guard will be closing this facility and moving to Woodlawn when construction on its new building is completed (in a year or two). City Council Member Paul Booth has asked NANA how the neighborhood would like to see this property used after the National Guard leaves. Neighborhood response to Council Member Booth will be discussed at the **September 11 NANA meeting**.

NANA held a brainstorming Charette on April 29 to identify possible future uses that would be compatible with our neighborhood for this large tract of land. A list of suggestions derived from this session and printed in the Summer 2001 *NANA News* will be available at the September meeting. NANA needs your input to determine a comprehensive neighborhood plan to relay to Council Member Booth.

IN MEMORIAM

Izella Kendrick (Clinton Springs) 83, died of heart failure July 26. She was founding director of the Retired and Senior Volunteer and Foster Grandparent programs in Cincinnati. She received commendations from Presidents Jimmy Carter & Richard Nixon. She was President of the Senior Classics at the Community Center and a supporter of NANA for over thirty years.

Adriana Pastoor (Belvedere) 89, died August 17 of cancer. Originally from Utrecht, Holland, she and her husband during World War II hid two Jewish teenagers in their attic for a year in Nazi-occupied Holland. Months after emigrating to Cincinnati her husband died suddenly leaving her alone to raise her four sons. She was the first beautification volunteer at the Belvedere.

**REVERSE THE BLIGHT

A group from North Avondale met four times this summer to participate in a community dialog facilitated by the National Conference for Community & Justice (NCCJ). We discussed diversity issues, the different types of racism, oppression, and superiority/inferiority. We shared our own experiences as well as discussed articles on the subject. We got to know each other on a different level and understood prejudice on a different level.

We observed the uniqueness of North Avondale and the history. Forty years ago the freeways were being built in downtown Cincinnati, displacing low income tenants. Laws were changed to quickly allow zoning downgrades. Incentives encouraged property owners to create multi-family housing for low income people.

NANA was started mostly by parents of North Avondale students to halt the destabilization of the neighborhood. Diversity and integration were welcomed. All people who would be good neighbors were accepted. The boundaries of North Avondale School at that time were chosen as the boundaries for North Avondale. These boundaries are unclear even now to many people, with maps differing according to year of origin and purpose.

NANA fiercely resisted downgrading the zoning in any part of the neighborhood. This protected property values in North Avondale. Values dropped in other neighborhoods where little or no resistance was met.

North Avondale has expensive homes as well as low income rentals. As a neighborhood, there is a feeling of separateness despite the diversity. The Clinton Springs Swim Club and North Avondale School are examples of systems that separate the neighborhood. But separateness mostly happens in minds and hearts when we feel we can't trust each other.

The first dialog group expressed the wish that we be a community where people care about and appreciate each other. We would encourage others to form a group or groups. NCCJ would be willing to facilitate. We might then wish to meet with the groups together. If interested call the NANA office at 221-6166.

North Avondale has made more progress in diversity than many Cincinnati neighborhoods. Will we continue on this journey or wait for everyone else to catch up?

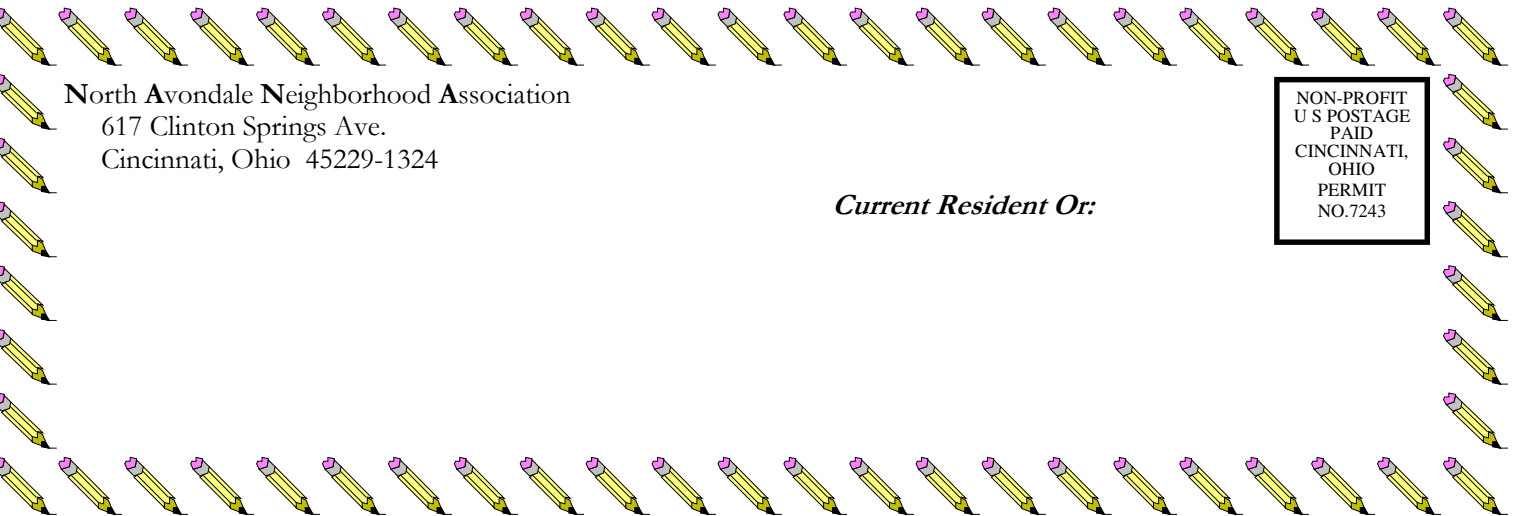
