
"SUNDAY AFTERNOON IN THE PARK... WITH NANA"

ZONING – CITY STAFF SUPPORTS SOME CHANGES REQUESTED BY NANA By Gerry Kraus

At its July 8, 2003 monthly meeting NANA passed 4 motions which were presented to the joint meeting of the Cincinnati Planning Commission and Council's Neighborhood & Public Services Committee on July 23 by NANA President John Jones. Motion #1 asked "that the zoning of the properties on Betula and Rose Hill between Beechwood and Red Bud, the properties on Stratford Place and the east side of Paddock Road north of Stratford Place to the Avon Fields Golf Course, and the properties on Barker Road and Norway west of Barker Road be changed from SF-10 [single family zone on lot size of at least 10,000 sq. ft.] to SF-20 [single family zone on lot size of at least 20,000 sq. ft.] and that the properties on Kessler Avenue and Kessler Place be changed from RMX [multi-family zone] to SF-4 [single family zone on 4,000 sq. ft. sized lot]". Planning staff agreed stating that "at the behest of the Planning Commission...the changes requested should be made." addition the staff changed the larger properties along Washington Avenue, Clinton Springs and Revel Ct from SF-10 to SF-20. After an earlier meeting with city planning staff several requested zone upgrades had already been approved (see July, 2003 NANA NEWS). The requests in NANA's Motion #1 dealt with requested changes in the new proposed zoning MAP.

The other motions passed by NANA were requests for changes in the <u>TEXT</u> of the proposed new zoning code as follows:

Motion #2 that Bed and Breakfast Homes & Child Day Care Homes and Child Day Care Center not be permitted in SF-20 & SF-10 and that no construction vehicles and/or equipment be allowed to be parked on or off the street in a residential zone unless being used in work on the property.

Motion #3: We ask that the city clarify the definition of commercial vehicles and clarify whether the following are allowed in a SF-district: trailers, RV's, Tractor (trailer and cab), pick-up trucks loaded with off site debris, oversize vehicles.

Motion #4: that the City value its' historical neighborhoods and by doing so seek to preserve the existing large homes on large lots by requiring that if a home is demolished it must be rebuilt with the same footprint or at least the same square footage and that the empty land remain empty.

The latest revised text of the new zoning code is not available as this newsletter goes to press, so it cannot be determined if the requests embodied in Motions #2, #3, #4 have been approved by the City's planning staff. The Cincinnati Planning Commission (CPC) is scheduled to meet on August 28 and will at that time determine if they should approve the proposed new zoning code or whether further public input is desirable. If and when the CPC approves the new zoning code, it will then go to City Council's Neighborhood and Public Services Committee chaired by Council Member David Pepper for consideration and ultimately to City Council for final approval.









DANA AVE., S. SHUTTLESWORTH, ALTER PLACE, BURTON - ZONING IN QUESTION

Upon further review of the zoning map it was noted that properties on Dana Avenue, Alter Place, Burton and part of S. Fred Shuttlesworth Circle (South Crescent) have been zoned RMX (Residential Mixed – 1 to 3 dwelling units, minimum land area for every dwelling unit—2,000 ft.). Since most of the properties on these streets are single family homes, NANA believes these streets should be zoned SF (single family). If you live on one of these streets, please call the NANA Office at 221-6166 and leave a message or come to the September 9 NANA meeting to tell us how you would like your street zoned.
