PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Whenever we suffer a loss of a friend, neighbor or loved one, it has the tendency to bring people together. Monday night August 28th was no exception as hundreds of cars lined the streets around Reading and Clinton Springs, Beechwood and Rose Hill Avenues for a candlelight vigil outside the home of Phil and Melanie Bates. Our many thoughts and prayers go out to the Bates family as they mourn the loss of Mr. Philip Bates who was fatally shot in front of his home after midnight on Sunday morning, August 27th.

What can we do to help curb the violence in our city? Start, with continued partnering with the police department and supplying them with all of the information we can when making a call for police service. Join with long standing programs that NANA is involved in:

- □ The monthly District Four Resource meetings (4th Wednesday of each month at 6:30 at District Four)
- [□] CPOP (Community Problem Oriented Policing) when we meet it is on the first Thursday of the month at 6:00 p.m. (call the NANA Office to make sure we are meeting that month)
- Quality of Life Taskforce In July, NANA was asked by an E-business expert with lots of experience in fighting deadbeat rental property owners in his Westwood community, to take part in a pilot program. It will assist us in targeting the "hot spots" by integrating police and other criminal data to give us more leverage when going after property owners and criminals alike. As some of the first statistics come in from this program over the following weeks, we are hopeful that it will help us put the squeeze on the criminal factor.
- Citizens on Patrol As Marilyn notes in her article, one of the most proven methods to keep the criminals from owning the street is for neighbors to band together as Citizens on Patrol. This helps to make the neighborhood more active outdoors and makes our streets less attractive to the criminals.
- Join or form your neighborhood Block Watch Groups (east of Reading Rd. is forming one. Contact Julie Zimmerman at 751-3199).
- □ We are exploring other options:
 - ⁿ An initiative to improve lighting at every home and throughout the neighborhood.
 - □ Hiring a private security company.
 - Talking to City Council Members about adding more patrols in the neighborhood

GATHERING STRENGTH By Marilyn Smith

A police sergeant at the scene said, "They heard somebody screaming for help. The voice started to fade and said, anyone?'...'

Out of shock and unfathomable disbelief friends and neighbors are drawn to the beautiful green tiled home of Phil & Melanie Bates. As a community, we stand – in grief stricken silence to mourn the loss of a neighbor and a friend. We look to each other through painful eyes, searching for solutions to problems we cannot comprehend. The cold reality hits home as we understand that our future safety hinges on our willingness to stand together.

First there was disbelief as ugly yellow tape was stretched around the yard, with black letters screaming CRIME SCENE to all who would look. Then rage, desperately demanding the tyrant or tyrants are brought down. Where is our protection? Who's going to fix this? The responses came in spurts of frustration

- Let's hire our own private security to drive around!
- Push city council to put more police patrols on our street!
- Maybe we should arm ourselves, so we'll be ready!
- Build a bigger jail to put the thugs in!

There are no "easy" buttons. North Avondale is our home and the thugs know we are "easy" buttons for them to push around. We must start walking our streets in groups of three or more. The Cincinnati Police can train us, give us police radios when we walk, and provide back up squad cars within 30 seconds. Most crime takes place in the daytime - houses are robbed then. If we are visibly patrolling our streets at random times those wannabe thieves and murderers learn that there are watchful eyes.

Come, walk with me. I walk every week as a trained volunteer for Citizens on Patrol I'm not a vigilante, and I'm not a thrill seeker either. I am one little old lady who understands that my watchful presence, is important to the safety of my neighborhood.

We are all horrified by the senseless slaughter of Mr. Bates As individuals; we are sickened by a prevailing sense of helplessness and frustration. As neighbors, walking side by side as a Citizen on Patrol; we proactively keep the silent vigil alive. ,.....

CPS IGNORES ACADEMICS IN CLOSING BURTON A SCHOOL OF CHOICE By Pauline Daly

CPS administration has recommended that Burton School, North Avondale's neighborhood school, be closed due to the decreased enrollment throughout CPS.

The school ratings just out are: Burton School - Continuous Improvement and both South Avondale and Rockdale - Academic Emergency. They propose to close our neighborhood school which is showing academic achievement and send the students to a school that has been in Academic Emergency for 5 years. Clearly at South Avondale the efforts being made to help the students successfully learn/achieve are not working.

Burton has been identified as a School of Choice. Parents whose children are assigned to failing schools can send their children to Burton. Yet if the proposed closing of Burton succeeds our neighborhood children will be sent to a failing school!

If Burton is closed the staff that achieved this success will be lost to the children in this area. We are proposing that CPS build both Burton and South Avondale Schools for 450 students, thus cutting 200 seats. Then the team formed to promote cooperation between Burton, Rockdale, South Avondale and North Avondale Schools would focus on improving academic performance in all schools.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

The graffiti defacing our house since October was removed, as of early July. We removed it ourselves, with help of a power washer from Louis Ginocchi. A number of residents on our end of Marion had offered to help, which we much appreciated. The initial delay was because paint remover will not work during the winter - it must be 65°F or warmer for it to be effective. There is also the problem that when a power washer is used, water can impregnate the limestone and during a cold spell could freeze and cause the stone to spall.

A further delay occurred because in February (as in Winter) some in the neighborhood complained to Channel 5, who came out and did a number on us. All of this resulted in the City of Cincinnati graffiti squad being called in to remove the offending messages - the city had denied the existence of this service when we had tried earlier to get them involved. I signed the necessary release forms (on February 7). They too said we would have to wait until warmer weather before work could begin. After three months of waiting and numerous phone calls and other messages, we finally heard from the city that they could not do the removal after all. They did not want to take responsibility for any careless and negligent actions of their crews, and we could not accept that situation. So, finally, at the end of June, I began the removal that I would have started earlier had the city had not been called in. Thus, the 8+ month delay was due half to the weather, and half to the involvement of the city as a result of the Channel 5 broadcast.

This was not random graffiti but hate messages for my wife and I: We were hurt the most by 4 RESTORATION (we are trying to bring our house back to what it looked like before Xavier turned it into a dorm, a preservation activity which the perpetrator seems to find distasteful). The last word is certainly much beyond the vocabulary accomplishments of most graffiti artists and is what confirms that the defacement was not random, but directed specifically at us.

And what was the purpose of the last hate message? Was it directed at me or was it to inflame the neighborhood? Whatever the reason it certainly worked at redirecting the anger to focus on one word among the graffiti. That the very act of effacing our house was a hate crime perpetrated by someone in the neighborhood did not seem to bother most individuals at all.

The perpetrator's audience responded by getting mad at usnot at him. Why no one showed any interest in condemning the perpetrator or in finding out who he was is beyond us.

In conclusion, we think when our neighborhood suffers from defacement, or drug trafficking, or robberies, it is because (a) the city's law enforcement department has been hamstrung too long by politicians who chose political goals over neighborhood safety, (b) the lack of a "tough on crime" attitude in city government and (c) hypocrisy regarding law breaking.

If the monetary value of our homes is in fact of concern to us, then it would seem obvious that the above basic issues need to be taken care of first. But it seems some people have other agendas.
